Whether we speak and write on esoteric aspects of our Craft, practical everyday how to live our lives or what the future brings for the world; Freemasonry has a part and lesson to teach. Bet you had

This year, we tried to change up our traditional approach to the 9HealthFair that is hosted at the Consistory. We decided to stop trying to butt heads with St. John's Church because they always use the last weekend of the fairs like we do. We couldn't do the first week, because that conflicted with the Shrine Circus which impacts a lot of our members that we rely on as volunteers. So, we approached the 9HealthFair offices and asked to do our fair a week earlier than the traditional schedule. Not only did they agree, they told us MANY fairs around the state are held early (in fact, many outlying areas with small populations held their fairs in March), and they suggested that by us hosting the fair early, we might well see an increase in our participation.

Last year, we served 158 participants (remember, we were head-to-head with St. John's, just 3 blocks away). This year, we hosted 250. Considering that all the advertisements on TV and radio imply only that the fair dates are between the two traditional weekends in April. So, the only advertising we had was the banner posted on the building at the corner of 14th and Grant, and then the other banner between the lampposts the day before the fair. Pretty good, all things considered.

This year, we only had 100 strips for the finger stick diabetes check. We used all of them, and of those folks screened, 1/3 of the participants had sufficiently high blood sugar to warrant a

recommendation that they see their doctor as soon as possible. That is a significant statistic.

Also, we had an unusual incident at this year's fair. It turns out that a woman probably in her late 40's was walking by the consistory at around 1130 just before the fair closed. She noticed the sign and walked in. Talking with Brother Randy Penn at the cashier's desk, she indicated that she hadn't been feeling well and wondered if there was someone she could talk with. Randy was astute enough to notice some things about her behavior and asked her four questions - she was 4 for 4 indicating she was having a heart attack. Brother Fred Runyan (EMT), Pat Coleman - an RN from Aurora South who was serving as our "Ask a Medical Professional" that day, Brother Chris Runyan (a First Responder) and Brother Kyle Mickleson – a FellowCraft and First Responder all came to her assistance to stabilize her while they waited for a 911 ambulance response. All we heard was that she was doing well after being seen at the hospital.

This points up not just the value of the 9HealthFair itself, but the very special folks we have in our membership who have been trained to respond to emergencies.

Here's looking to an even more successful fair in 2011. We learned a LOT this year – both positive and negative things – and we'll be making adjustments to make things run smoother – hopefully we'll be able to run our fair early next year like we did this year.

AND ... most importantly, THANK YOU to every volunteer that helped make the fair a success. It simply cannot be done without your support.
