The Camp!

This month, we celebrate a new class of candidates coming into our valley, a successful Reunion and many new memories. The Reunion that we just completed and the Camp setting which is discussed in the 32nd degree have many connections which we never speak about. No way, you say! Yes. A Reunion is nothing more than a recruiting and training camp.

The Camp is a symbolic representation of a medieval camp of knights on their way to a Crusade. It is a moveable, fighting group that assembles new warriors along the way to the battle, which happened in history in all the different Crusades. This makes sense when you realize that all the obligations and oaths (along with principles and goals) are based on a Knight's experiences and whose goal is to prepare for a battle. Not a physical fight, but against all the groups and negative attributes that are in the world. When you realize we are to fight against intolerance, fanaticism and ignorance - you see whom the battle will be against.

This Scottish Rite camp teaches and trains new members, heals those who have been injured in past battles and gathers like minded individuals to strengthen us. The camp is laid out like an old style military camp, on a hill with a good view of all that is around it and with its leaders in the center.

There is much more to this military camp, if you research the Crusades and how western European groups went to the Middle East during these years, you will learn much more in the connections.

It is easy to skip over such a plain picture when doing research and thinking on all that is given to us within the 29 degrees. It is one dimensional with not much said about it. But the camp is not one dimensional. Like many other objects, we see it printed on a flat page; the camp is on a hill or terraced mountain with ramps on its sides that connect the different levels. The shape only looks flat on the page.

The Mentor

What is a mentor? The word mentor is defined in the dictionary as "a wise and faithful adviser, friend or teacher." You could say that a mentor could also be looked at as a coach. A coach will encourage people to build on their strengths, equip them to tackle areas of improvement and enable them to achieve ongoing success. A good coach also recognizes that people have different needs.

With that in mind, I would like to share my experience as I reached out for light. My father, a Mason for as long as I can remember, tried to encourage me to join a lodge for many years. My response had been nothing but excuses as to why I was always "too busy."

During a business trip to LA a few years ago, my dad and I attended a charity event with some of his friends. As the evening progressed I discovered that this was actually a Masonic event and that I enjoyed the experience and the people that I came in contact with. As the timing was now right, I asked my dad if he could help find me a lodge in Denver.

My dad checked a Shrine directory and called then Potentate Tony Datillo and asked him to recommend a lodge for me. Tony contacted his Lodge, which led to an invitation to attend a dinner.

During my first visit I was introduced around, but one person in particular seemed to make it his priority to take me under his wing.

At each subsequent dinner, this man, whom I now know to be my MENTOR and brother, made it his priority to greet me and he spent each evening talking to me about Masonry. He answered my questions and explained things to me about the fraternity. He always made me feel welcome and made me look forward to the next opportunity to find out more.

Ultimately I submitted my petition for the degrees and was raised several months later. Each step of the way my Mentor was there to encourage me.

Once I became a Master Mason, my mentor began to introduce me to some of the other bodies within Masonry and explained what it meant to become further involved and how I could expand my Masonic education.

After discussing the Scottish Rite and the Shrine, he invited me to a Friday lunch here at the Consistory and a lunch at the Shrine. On both occasions he took the time to fill me in on the organizations, gave me a comprehensive tour of each facility and when I expressed an interest he provided petitions.

My mentoring experience, which introduced me to all aspects of Masonry, clearly began with my first visit to a lodge by a brother that cared about me and, as I grew to find out, has a true love of our fraternity!

I believe that this brother, Clarence Cox, represents my image of the ULTIMATE MENTOR! He became a valued friend, my teacher and Masonic coach. He not only took the time to address my questions about Masonry, but was wise enough to recognize my needs and abilities.

So where am I now? I am a Past Master, belong to four lodges, the Scottish Rite, the York Rite bodies, the Shrine and some other related Masonic organizations.

If it had not been for the encouragement from my mentor I do not believe that my Masonic journey would have resulted with me speaking to you here tonight.

I have been a shy person most of my life, and as a result could have joined a lodge and simply moved to the sidelines.

Since becoming a Scottish Rite Mason it has been my pleasure to serve on the Class Committee. In that role, I have seen many brothers come into our midst, expressing excitement to broaden their Masonic education, only to fall off the charts and rarely and sometimes never be seen again at our Stated Meetings or Reunions.

All of these brothers had a mentor when they submitted their petitions. As a first line signer it is important to remember that our responsibility does not end with the Reunion.

Is it necessary for all mentors to be as diligent as Clarence? NO! What is necessary is for all of us to be open to mentoring our brothers, both those new to our various bodies and those that have joined but have moved to the sidelines.

We have a responsibility to ourselves, the Masonic bodies we belong to and most importantly to those brothers that will become involved in our fraternity to mentor them.

We all hear how our numbers continue to decline. It seems that we can all take a lead from my mentoring experience as to how we can better serve our fraternity by taking a greater interest in our brothers. This can be an invitation to lunch or a Stated Meeting or to ASK THEM to help out with a task.

Based on my experience with the brothers coming through the Reunions, I believe that almost all of them are looking to fulfill a need to expand their Masonic education and involvement.

Mentoring these brothers can be as simple as extending a personal invitation to take a part in a degree or become a member one of our committees.

This simple act may be the key to making someone feel welcome and be the trigger to getting them involved.

The Eleventh Hour of the Eleventh Day of the Eleventh Month - the date and time in 1918 that marked the signing of the Armistice between the Allies of World War I and Germany. Originally called "Armistice Day" - later also called "Remembrance Day" and lately called "Veteran's Day" - it was declared a national holiday in many of the nations who fought in World War I.

In the United States, Veteran's Day is observed differently from other nations, where that date is specifically set aside to honor those who died in action, our Veteran's Day honors ALL American veterans, living, killed in action, or dead from other causes.

In many parts of the world people observe two consecutive minutes of silence at 11 a.m. as a sign of respect - in the first minute for the roughly 20 million who died in the war, and in the second minute for those living left behind - generally understood to be the wives, children, and families deeply affected by the conflict.

MEN OF MUSIC

Over the past few months, we've looked at our Brothers of note from various professions as well as some of them who were not exactly the kind we should be "proud" of today. Let's look at some SPE-CIAL brothers - who gave us the pleasure of music in our lives.

Thomas Augustine ARNE (1710-1778)

Best known for "Rule Brittania" and "God Save the King". Leading theatre composer of 18th century.

Johann Christian BACH (1735-1782)

11th and youngest son of Johann Sebastian Bach, also known as the "London" Bach, and noted for influencing the concerto style of Mozart.

Irving BERLIN (1888-1989)

Born Israel Isidore Beilin, one of the most prolific American composers—over 1500 songs, 19 Broadway shows, 18 Hollywood films. Songs included "Easter Parade" and "White Christmas."

Sir Henry Rowley BISHOP (1786-1855) English composer of 1220 dramatic works including 80 operas, light operas, cantatas, and ballets. You might be familiar with "Home Sweet Home."

William BOYCE (1710-1779)

One of the most important English-born composers of the 18th century, largely forgotten today. Composer of the British and Canadian Naval March "Heart of Oak."

Ferdinand (Ferde) Rudolph von GROFÉ (1892-1972) Composer, arranger, and jazz pianist of 20's and 30's. If you hear Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue played by an orchestra, chances are you are hearing the arrangement by Grofé. His Grand Canyon Suite is probably the most famous independent work.

William Christopher HANDY (1873-1958) Blues composer and trumpeter. Widely known as the "Father of the Blues."

Franz Joseph HAYDN (1732-1809) Father of the symphony and string quartet. Teacher of Ludwig Beethoven and friend of Mozart.

Lauritz MELCHIOR (1890-1973)

Danish-born American operatic tenor. The preeminent Wagnerian tenor of the 20's, 30's and 40's.

Johann Nepomuk HUMMEL (1778-1837)

Austrian composer and virtuoso pianist. Represents the transition from "classical" to "romantic" era in composition. Most well-known for his Trumpet Concerto.

Giacomo MEYERBEER (1791-1864)

German opera composer. Described as the most successful stage composer of the 19th century.

Leopold MOZART (1719-1787)

German composer, conductor, teacher, and violinist. Best known today as the father and teacher of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and for his violin textbook.

Wolfgang Amadeus MOZART (1765-1791) Music prodigy, prolific composer, including "Magic Flute" - an opera believed to be based on Masonic allegory.

Sigmund ROMBERG (1887-1951)

Best known for musicals and operettas, particularly "The Student Prince", "The Desert Song", and "The New Moon."

Johan Julius Christian (Jean) SIBELIUS (1865-1957) Finish composer of the late Romantic period. Played an important role in the formation of Finnish national identity ("Finlandia" is most familiar composition)

John Stafford SMITH (1750-1836) English composer of the tune now used for the "Star Spangled Banner"

Sir Arthur Seymour SULLIVAN (1842-1900) Best known for 14 operatic collaborations with W. S. Gilbert including "Mikado", "Pirates of Penzance", and "H.M.S. Pinafore". Composed 23 operas, 13 major orchestral works, eight choral works and oratorios, two ballets. Composed "Onward Christian Soldiers" and "The Lost Chord".

John Philip SOUSA (1854-1932)

Famously known as the "March King." Conductor of the U.S. Marine band. Wrote 136 marches, 15 operettas, 70 songs and many other pieces. You will no doubt recognize: "The Stars and Stripes Forever", "Semper Fidelis" and the "Washington Post March"

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




