

TRUSTING IN GOD BUT GUIDED BY MASONRY

I knelt for the first time before the altar of Freemasonry ten years ago in Golden City Lodge No. 1 and was asked, "In whom do you put your trust?" and then took the oath and obligation of an Entered Apprentice Mason. The experiences that June evening have been indelibly etched in my mind.

Membership in the Masonic Fraternity has always been a universally recognized badge of honor that stresses character. The fundamental Masonic teachings are love of God, loyalty to country, a high standard of personal morality, and a belief in the universal brotherhood of man. Masons find an inner peace and contentment when they are contributing to the well-being, growth and support of their community and the church of their choice, as well as to the Fraternity.

I've asked myself, what attracts these men to Masonry? What was its appeal? Why are so many of them ardent and active members throughout their lifetimes? I soon realized early in my Masonic involvement that these questions also applied to me. I am sure they must have been of concern to each of us during our early and most impressive Masonic years. Certainly it was not due to solicitation. No man is ever asked to join. However, today, the internet, available pamphlets and literature and various programs and activities open to the public, is encouraging a positive response for Masonry from men in many areas of life.

I believe the answer is found in Freemasonry's lofty idealism and its focus on character. Membership in Masonry is recognized as a standard of honor, of Brotherhood, of uprightness and decency.

From the founding of this nation through today, fourteen Presidents of the United States of America were Masons. Innumerable Senators and Representatives, Justices of the Supreme Court, National and International military leaders, Governors and elected officials in the many states, leaders in education, industry, medicine, science, law and technology have also been members. Also, many of the persons who led their native lands into democratic forms of government in Europe, South and Central America were Freemasons.

Masons today have been climbing on the shoulders of an endless line of magnificence, of men across the centuries who believed in and acknowledged the basic teachings of Freemasonry. I am convinced the teachings of Masonry have not changed. While all dimensions of life are adjusting to a new age, to a changing world, to computer technology, the basic concepts of the Fatherhood of God, of Brotherhood, of honor, of uprightness and decency will never change. We have a rich heritage in Freemasonry. It is ours to grasp and follow during our lifetimes, and is incumbent upon us to pass it on to future generations.

Let us never forget, or lose sight of the truth, that Masonry begins at the Altar in the Lodge Room. Its foundation is a belief in the existence of a Supreme Being. This is the first and fundamental principle in the life of every Mason. Hear again the question, "In whom do you put your trust?"

King Solomon is credited by most Biblical scholars for the words in Proverbs 3:5-6, words written three thousand years ago, a thousand years before Christ, "Trust in God with all your heart and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will direct your paths."

In all aspects of life God is to be taken into account. The thought of God is not to be limited to special seasons or sacred places. God is to be acknowledged in the home, in business, at work, and at play. In other words, God is to be thought of sufficiently to influence conduct and life. To acknowledge God requires true humility. Upon God we are dependent for life and breath and everything else. Acknowledging God will help a man not to think of himself more highly than he ought to.

Yet, Masonry is not a religion, nor is it a substitute for religion. Masonry is not interested, nor concerned, in how a man may develop his religious faith. However, it does stand for toleration of the teachings and practices of all faiths that rest upon this first and fundamental principle: belief in the existence of a Supreme Being!

Men of various religious faiths come into Masonry in our great nation, as well as in nations in the uttermost parts of the world. They retain the religion of their choice and are strengthened in the practice of their particular beliefs by the truths and teachings of Masonry. God is known by many names, and worshipped in many ways. There are no religious restrictions to anyone who would become a Mason, provided he is not an atheist. So, a Hindu, a Buddhist, a Muslim, a Hebrew, a Christian can all agree "In God We Trust".

Everything in Masonry makes reference to God, implies God, speaks of God, and points and leads to God. Every degree, symbol, obligation, lecture and charge, finds its meaning and derives its majesty from God, the Great Architect and Master Builder of the Universe.


While Masonry is religious, it is not, even in the most remote sense, a religion. Masonry has no creed, no confession of faith, no doctrinal statement, no theology. Masonry does not assert and does not teach that one religion is as good as another. It does not say that all religions are equal simply because men of all religions are Masons. It is precisely because we are not a religion, we can come together as men of faith. Masonry asks only if a man believes in God. If he were asked if he believed in Christ, or Buddha, or Allah, that would be a theological test involving a particular interpretation of God. Belief <u>in</u> God is faith; belief <u>about</u> God is theology.

From its very beginning, Masonry has insisted that religion and politics are not suitable subjects for consideration within the Lodge Room. Masonry believes in principles rather than political programs. Principles unite men; political programs divide them. So we are taught to leave our opinions on religion and politics outside the door of the Lodge Room. Masonry is a Brotherhood whose trust is in God. Its stress has always been on character.

We are charged to maintain peace and harmony, and to uphold the chief Masonic virtue: charity or brotherly love. Membership in Masonry is recognized as a standard of honor, of Brotherhood, of uprightness and decency. We are sure that he who is true to the principles he learns in Freemasonry will be a better church member, a better businessman and a better citizen because of it.

Grand Chaplain, Brother Charles H. Lacquement of Pennsylvania, points out: "Freemasonry gets its amazing vitality because its foundation is laid on the great truths from which come the great moral lessons it inculcates. Behind the two great truths, the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man, is the chief Masonic virtue, Charity or Brotherly Love. Masons are taught to practice this virtue at all times and to assimilate it into their very lives. It is this virtue that leads Masons to do their duties, to stretch forth a helping hand to a fallen brother, to hold a brother's reputation equally with his own, to whisper good counsel in his ear, and in the most friendly manner, endeavor to bring about the best person this brother can be. In so doing, the Mason is strengthening his own inner self and bringing about the best in himself. Masonry makes in men, strength of character, of thought, and of emotional stability."

And so, following that most impressive and unforgettable night 10 years ago when I first knelt before the Altar of Freemasonry, and was asked the question, "In whom do you put your trust?", I have traveled, as you have, across many peaceful and many troubled waters, and again and again my trust in God strengthened me. No person, more especially a Mason, can live for himself alone. We are guided by the great teachings of Masonry, the Fatherhood of God, the Brotherhood of Man, and the chief Masonic virtue, Charity or Brotherly Love.



BETWEEN THE COLUMNS

"THE WORD"



Of all of our secrets, there is one part of it that is the most cherished – the word that was given to all Master Masons when they get to the end of the 3° in their Blue Lodge. That word, for which I will use a substitute while writing about it here; is special, unique and cryptic.

Albert Mackey has a good entry in his Masonic Encyclopedia, Coil goes even deeper and longer on the topic; Brother Pike refers to it in general 79 times in his <u>Morals and Dogma</u>. True learning about this set of letters that form not only a meaning, a description, a truth and a person, is a quest worthy of all; no matter if you are a errant knight or not.

We as Masons, use a lot of words. This is very clear to any one, especially if you learn a small part of our ritual. We are wordy. This is not bad. In a time and age where the use of words is on the decline (just think of texting styles and the dumbing down of the level of news reporting), we stand out. Advancing to each level of chair requires learning more lines, understanding new (old) words and tying your tongue in knots sometimes with them. We use words as passwords, tests, and knowledge. Our words can be sacred, scriptural, allegoric and symbols themselves. Truly, any study of this can be a journey in itself.

Ultimately, the word is a way to know yourself and Deity. For if you can understand, even partly, all that is contained in these simple letters, you will have gained much knowledge and have put thought and time into it.

Masons are not the only groups to have these "words". All through the ages any group that restricts access to themselves and knowledge have them. You may have had a small number of them given to you when you joined different modern day clubs or groups.

Don't let that number or the simplicity in use deter you from learning what all this means to you. Whether it is just the real pronunciation of God's name, finding something about it that was lost, or see it as a quest; learning even the various substitute or temporary words will take you places and teach you things that will amaze and challenge you.

We may never be able to totally understand all that this simple word possesses here in this life, Brother Henry Coil has some words for us to consider on this topic –

"... which attempts to bring the Divine Essence down to Earth and within man's comprehension. Man possesses no words from the Great Beyond with which to describe anything in that limitless space, and, should anyone return thence with such vocabulary, it would be incomprehensible, not known to us! So, the real lesson of the Lost Word and to possess the True Word, not with the expectation of complete success, [is to] but partly to spiritualize his earthly existence and to better the practical lives of those around him. Freemasonry is essentially a practical institution."

I think he gets it only partially right, his conclusion is in line with how he treats all Masonic themes – light on the esoteric and heavy on the practicality side. While the search does have a practical theme, it is much more than just that.

Some think that the whole system of Freemasonry, including the Scottish Rite came from trying to understand this theme – **the word**. That all we have as ritual and principle is but to understand certain words and to be able to apply what we have learned.

Understanding The WORD, whether a symbol, a set of letters, or a general theme is a worthy pilgrimage. One required if you seek for truth and enlightenment. Don't be afraid to start this if you have not yet done so. All that you have learned so far in your Masonic life will connect to it and will translate into something that will change your life.

9 Health Fair

The 2014 Denver Consistory 9Health Fair is officially "in the books". We served 219 participants, MOST of whom had bloodwork done. The IMPORTANT thing to remember is that when you have bloodwork done at 9HealthFair, it costs \$30 for the basic Blood Chemistry Screening, which would cost you anywhere from \$150-250 outside, depending on how the work is coded by your doctor, whether your insurance allows it and covers it, and who does it. I have very PERSONAL experience with this very situation. And, while other blood screenings are available at additional cost, each of them likewise is a bargain compared to the cost you might have to pay out-of-pocket.

Oh, you say you have insurance? Or, the Affordable Care Act (ACA, a.k.a "Obamacare") will cover that? Well, you might want to CHECK just to be sure. There are a lot of changes happening, and there are more changes coming on the horizon - so it's always a possibility that what you have now may or may not be available to you down the road. Just keep an open mind and stay INFORMED.

Other blood work available at 9HealthFairs:

Blood Cell Count (\$15) Vitamin D Screening (\$40) Hemoglobin A1C Screening (\$25) PSA (for men only) Screening (\$25)

This year, we had 33 MEDICAL volunteers supporting our fair - 4 of whom were members of the consistory and 1 was a spouse of a member. We had 43 NON-MEDICAL volunteers supporting the fair, 35 of whom are members of our consistory and 5 spouses were also with us. We typically have a very small number of outside volunteers (mostly from the Lion's Club or other related organizations) that provide generic support to the 9HealthFairs across the state.

To each and every one of you who turned out to support the fair - <u>THANK YOU VERY MUCH</u> - not just for your time, but for caring about your health and the health of our neighbors in the area. This is the most priceless gift you can give.



There will be a dinner at 6:00pm. Guest \$15.00. Free to Candidates and First Line Signers.




