

EDITOR'S SOAPBOAX By Bill Hickey, 32° KCCH




As I am predisposed to do SOMETIMES, while I was working on this issue - and looking at the birthday data file that I get from the office, I thought it would prove interesting to look at the AGE distribution of our membership - both by age in years, and then by grouping the numbers by DECADE of age. Please remember, these numbers represent (LITERALLY) a "snapshot" in time—from last year's database dump less the members we have lost to death this year. I do not yet have the data from the last two classes in the database I use, and even though I get a new pull after the first of the year, it's not a "sure thing" that the last class information will have made it into the database back at Supreme yet. So, take absolute numbers "with a grain of salt" - but the overall DISTRIBUTION and TRENDS are probably valid.



What does THIS graph of numbers by age in years tell YOU?

What that previous graph tells ME is that our biggest numbers by age group seem to be between 75-87 years old. And further, it tells me that under age 57 our demographics drop off dramatically as you look at the younger men in Masonry. So, let's take a look at a slightly different way to express the numbers. Clump together the yearly numbers into decades (e.g.: 90-99 years old).



Well, guess what? Plotting the numbers against the DECADE of ages tells us a similar story, but one that has a bit more significance. For example, if you look at the raw numbers for those in their 60's through 80's, you should conclude that these three decade groups comprise the MAJORITY of our current membership.

Without necessarily saying that we need to focus more attention on the younger decade groups, doesn't it make you wonder WHY we're not seeing more of our brothers in the decades of their 30's through 50's?

As brother Jerry Screws was so fond of saying "membership is a CONTACT sport." Membership numbers are a concern in ALL fraternal, social, and professional groups - ours is not unique in that regard. The problem is complex, so the solution will NOT be simple.



**Etiquette and the Scottish Rite Mason** 

"A lodge is a school for gentlemen" - H. L. Haywood



My wife Denise has always told me that Freemasonry scratched an itch I did not know I had. And I guess that is true. It has forever changed me into what I am today. I will not or could not go back to what I was before I knocked the first time on the outside of a lodge door to gain admission. Freemasonry's tenets and principles have become ingrained and are now a part of me. She has also told me that as a woman (and thus an outsider) she sees how it is the first exposure for many to decorum and etiquette.

I suppose she is right in that too. One would not expect to find such a reliance on courtesy and good behavior in the lodge room, yet that is what we see all the time. One has to wait to be acknowledged before speaking; there are proper ways to do things. In the rough and tumble everyday life of men, Freemasonry provides a way to grow and mature into something better. You would never associate etiquette with what we do, but it sneaks its way in and becomes a part of all we do. Our fraternity says we have procedures and decorum that should be followed – quite a difference from our regular work/public worlds.

This is one aspect of the ritual that we have both in the Blue Lodges and the Valleys of the Scottish Rite that is overlooked; maybe for the reason that we men never think of it. We address each other with terms common to all, but respectful – brother, Worshipful Master... We promote non-vulgarity, moderation on drinking, fidelity, ethical treatment of women, and in most lodges and valleys a proper dress and attire. We discuss items that don't cause offense (no religion or personal politics) yet bond ourselves into a group that has very open discussions and thought-provoking subjects. We are taught to look at a person for what they are on the inside and not by class, race or age. The ritual we use has an underlying layer that no one ever mentions – it makes us gentlemen.

Maybe you have friends in the Consistory that dress nice, smell good, and have good taste in food or drink. "Class" can be something much different than what we have in the Green Room at our Reunions. : )

I wonder if any of my readers have found this out? It comes on slowly and without any fanfare to the average man who comes to Masonry, sneaks up and before you know it, sets you on a path to be a gentleman. We get to rub shoulders with those of a higher social class than in our everyday world, and this is just one way that we absorb still more without even knowing it.

Yes, Freemasonry has changed me, in more ways than what we normally associate with when I say this. We are exposed to much more culture than we had ever known before. Our history should teach us that the founding fathers of our group were mainly gentlemen. The

first speculative Masons were English men with land and titles; some were businessmen, a number were naturalists (scientists of that day) and a few were clergy. I expect that many of you were like me and never wore a tuxedo or a suit on a regular basis before joining an officer line or in any of the other Masonic bodies where you have to do so. And now it is not a big deal. I hear all the time discussions about cuff links, French cuffs, tying real bow ties and the advantages of a vest over a cummerbund. This is not what the average man on the street will discuss!

As I have always put forth, the path to enlightenment is not just about knowledge. The path of a Scottish Rite Mason is one of betterment and advancement. How fitting that all this shows on the outside too, when we allow it. The first obligation we ever took set the ground-work for us to be gentlemanly (check it out!). And as we advance through the various degrees we become much different than when we started. So men, be gentlemen. Stand out in the world and fulfill in your life what is seen all around you in Freemasonry.





The eMasons' Charge

Brethren, the duties and charges of a Freemason are well suited to the Internet and should be practiced to their fullest extent.

HONESTY: to show the Craft as it is, and how we wish it were.
CHARITY: to forgive those who speak out of malice or ignorance.
STRENGTH: to refrain from being drawn into irrelevant arguments.
TEMPERANCE: to moderate the passions, and not rise to taunts.
FIDELITY: to ever be mindful of our obligations.
RECTITUDE: to correct in ourselves what we see wrong in others.
PIETY: to understand that our opinions are just that, opinions.
TOLERANCE: to know that others' opinions are also just opinions.
COURTESY: to observe the rules of etiquette.
EQUALITY: to appear neither condescending nor unduly humble.
JOY: to be happy, and communicate happiness.

Let all our transactions via the Internet **demonstrate by example** what we as Freemasons aspire to in our daily lives. With our zeal and fidelity let us promulgate the genuine principles of the Craft, and diffuse the light of Wisdom rather than fan the flames of ignorance.

### **HOGMANAY?** What is this "HOGMANAY" thing?

Hogmanay is celebrated on New Year's Eve, every year, usually in a most exuberant fashion in Scotland as hundreds of thousands of revellers take to the streets to see in the New Year. In the cities of Glasgow and Edinburgh it has become a huge ticketed festival. Celebrations start in the early evening and reach a crescendo by midnight. Minutes before the start of new year, a lone piper plays, then the bells of Big Ben chime at the turn of midnight, lots of kissing, and everyone sings Auld Lang Syne. And then there is more kissing. Elsewhere in Scotland, particularly in more remote parts, customary first footing and Scottish dances, or ceilidhs (pronounced "kayli"), take place. For centuries, fire ceremonies -- torch light processions, fireball swinging and lighting of New Year fires -- played an important part in the Hogmanay celebrations. And they still do.

#### Where did the word Hogmanay come from?

Nobody knows for sure where the word "Hogmanay" came from. Opinions differ as to whether it originated from the Gaelic *oge maidne* ("New Morning"), Anglo-Saxon *Haleg Monath* ("Holy Month"), or Norman French word *hoguinané*, which was derived from the Old French *anguillanneuf* ("gift at New Year"). It's also been suggested that it came from the French *au guimener* ("lead to the mistletoe") or a Flemish combo *hoog* ("high" or "great"), *min* ("love" or "affection") and *dag* ("day"). Take your pick.

#### **The Tradition of the Burns Supper**

Burns Suppers have been a part of Scottish culture for a little over 200 years. It's the time of year we commemorate the birth of the famous poet and Masonic Poet Laureate, the great Rabbie (or Robert) Burns. He was born on 25 January 1759 in Alloway, near Ayr on the west coast of Scotland and he died when he was only 37 years old on 21 July 1796.

He wrote hundreds of poems and songs and left a huge legacy for the people of Scotland. One of his poems, "The Address to the Haggis" has become immortalized and is now a central part of a Burns Supper. The first Burns Supper was believed to have been in July of 1801 to mark the anniversary of his death. It was held in Alloway when a group of his friends got together.

It was on this occasion that some of the traditions which are now associated with a Burns Supper were started, such as piping in the haggis, reading of his poems, and the ever-popular toasts to the Lads and Lassies.

While in Scotland, the entire menu will consist of haggis, here in the United States, it is more often a "starter" or optional side dish with a more traditional dish being the main course.


