The Rev. James Harris, 32° KCCH Named "Mason of the Year"

The Rev. James H. Harris, 32° KCCH, was honored as *"Mason of the Year"* during the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Colorado last January for his years of service, not only to the Masonic Fraternity, but to his family, friends, and community as well.

Jim retired two years ago after having served 37 years in the ordained ministry for the United Methodist Church. He has served as Chair of the Rocky Mountain Conference Board of Pensions and is currently Vice-President of the Commission on History and Archives. He volunteers in the Archives Department of the Iliff School of Theology and remains active by preaching and leading workshops.

Brother Jim began his Masonic career in Englewood Lodge #166 by becoming a Master Mason and later served his Lodge as Worshipful Master.

He became a 32° Scottish Rite Mason during Denver Consistory's Fall 2001 Reunion. In 2005, he was invested as a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor (KCCH). He served the Consistory as Venerable Master of the Centennial Lodge of Perfection in 2009 and has served as Consistory Prelate since that time.

Our Brother didn't stop there. He has also served the Consistory by working in several different Committees, to include Properties and as a cast member in the 8th Degree. He is a Life Member of the Scottish Rite Foundation.

In the York Rite, Jim is a member of Denver Chapter #2, Royal Arch Masons, where he served as High Priest in 2010; a member of Colorado Commandery #1, Knights Templar, where he served as Commander in 2010; and is a member of Denver Council #1, Cryptic Masons. He served two years as Grand Commandery Prelate and three years as Grand Council Prelate.

Jim is a member of the Royal Order of Scotland, the Order of the Red Cross of Constantine, the Ish Sodi Degree (this is a York Rite Invitation-Only degree) and the York Rite Sovereign College of North America.

Brother Jim served the Grand Lodge of Colorado, AF&AM, as Prelate for three years; was on the Board of Trustees for the Masonic Library and Museum Association and was Chair, Grand Lodge Charters and Dispensations.

Jim is like that bunny that keeps going and going and going, even though you know the batteries should have run down long ago.

A busy man! A busy Mason! The Rev. James H. Harris is an outstanding choice to be honored as **MASON OF THE YEAR** by Colorado's Grand Lodge of Masons. It is a well-deserved honor.

THE PRELATE'S PULPIT

A Masonic poet has written: "No man could tell me what my soul might be; I sought for God, and He eluded me; I sought my Brother out, and found all three." I recently attended the raising of a Master Mason at the Jacques DeMolay Lodge #171. I watched mostly from the side lines. However, I joined my brothers in several portions of the degree. We all participated in the degree.

The candidate was never alone. He was always surrounded by his Brothers. It was very moving to see him kneel at the altar and kiss the Holy Scriptures. The altar is the most important piece of furniture in the lodge room. The lodge room itself is a symbol of the world. Standing at the center of the Masonic world is the altar. The Great Architect is present with us. That Brother will never be alone. He now has his Brothers.

After the building of King Solomon's temple, there were two altars. They were the Altar of Burnt Offering, where sacrifices were burnt outside the temple, and the Altar of Incense, inside the Temple. This article will certainly make you think. Brother Curt has given his permission to use this article in the RiteWorks and the Consistory Newsletter.]

As Masons, we learned in the First Degree that "sincerity and plain-dealing distinguish us." On face value, the ideals of sincerity and plain-dealing would seem to be the norm when we traverse the world outside of our home and Lodge.

But in today's crass and crude world, we see that acts of sincerity are usually replaced with rudeness, insolence, and cynicism. The rough and tumble business world in which most of us work requires a tough nose to succeed, but that is OK. Plain-dealing, however, seems to have become a quaint anachronism replaced by the depths of unbridled ambition and unethical behavior.

Unfortunately, the idea of a "square deal" is treated as just another one of those "square ideas" that is no longer relevant in a modern world.

Since I became a Mason, I have become accustomed to seeing that dignified sense of sincerity which most Mason personify. We all have an inner truth detector and can tell when we are being treated with a sense of dignity and sincerity.

No one wants to be dismissed by someone with a sense of superiority or give the quick brush-off. Masons usually greet each other with a simple "how's it going?" and we really do mean it with a sense of sincerity, because we really do care about each other.

I hope you feel those ideals of Masonry when sharing friendship and brotherly love with your Brethren. I surely do.

Just because Masons present a persona of sincerity, it does not mean that we are all stone-faced and boring to be around. The opposite is true. A lively discussion of the football game that got away, the latest hot cars, and improving golf scores usually punctuates conversations among Masons.

Yet, it always amazes me that Masons can switch their attention and conversations on-adime, and go from a light subject to a deep thought about philosophy and life in a heartbeat.

Maybe it is because we can do it with a feeling of trust and sincerity that we have developed as Masons. The bonds that link Masons together are varied and complicated, but sometimes it is just as simple as our sense of sincerity.

I encourage all our brethren to rekindle those ideals of sincerity and plain-dealing, because they truly distinguish us as Masons. Call up a Brother for a cup of coffee, visit a Brother in need, sit in Lodge with old and new friends, and live a life of sincerity and plain-dealing.

I sincerely hope that Masonry will help us all become better men.

SIMPLE QUESTION, SIMPLE ANSWER

As it sometimes happens to those who write articles for Denver Consistory's publications, the idea for that article often comes to you right out of the blue.

When talking with a Brother and his wife after lunch several weeks ago, I commented on what a busy schedule I had, adding that I sometimes felt overwhelmed by it all. The Brother's response, of course, was that I needed to slow down. He wasn't suggesting I drop everything, but maybe think a little about why I sometimes have this feeling.

Some Brothers have busier Masonic lives than I do and some less, but I believe it is a safe bet to say everyone, at one time or another, feels overwhelmed at times and question their reasons for staying so busy. Granted, we all had different reasons for becoming a Mason and even staying in the Fraternity. I think there is one over-riding factor involved for most of us.

The "IT" (the WHY we all do what we do) that hit me after lunch that day was the first few words of a poem by Elizabeth Barrett Browning titled How Do I Love Thee?: "How do I love thee? Let me count the ways." Yes, I know the how and why the poem was written (Google is a wonderful thing, after all) but I also believe those few words answer that question. We do what we do because of a love for the Fraternity.

I have always discussed my growth in Masonry, from my "birth" (being initiated an Entered Apprentice in 1991) to my current station in Masonry and everything in between. I believe also that many, including myself, have been through that stage in our Masonic life, thinking that if Lodge is good, then more Masonic groups are better. Often times, we discover that this is not necessarily true.

I'm sure that mental health professionals have fancy words for doing that sort of thing, but the truth is that there are still only 24 hours in a day. No Brother can keep up this hectic pace for long without suffering some sort of consequences, whether it be to your health, family, employment and so on.

A former employer of mine strongly felt that thinking outside of the box and going beyond our mostly self imposed boundaries in life would make us better and more productive employees and scheduled the necessary training for this.

.Those same people training us to "think outside the box" continually remind us that sometimes we have to step back and get away from that "more is better" syndrome, even if it means letting go of something in order to maintain and/or regain our health and sanity.

My way of dealing with this feeling of being overwhelmed was to concentrate more on fewer activities such as the ritualistic aspect of Masonry. Unfortunately, some see this as keeping newer, younger Brothers from participating in the Degrees, something that is simply not true. Naturally, that is not the situation today. I tend to add to my schedule as most of you Brothers do.

For those who crave the praise and keep doing more to get it, remember what Albert Einstein once said: "The only way to escape the corruptible effect of praise is to keep on working."

Is there a solution to this dilemma for any of us? No one can really answer that. I know that if someone asks for my help, I will continue to give it. If I see something needing to be done around the Consistory, I will offer to help. It is not in my nature to be any other way. Some time ago, I asked the question: "Is Masonry all that I am about?" and I answered no, but it is a major part of my life.

I recognize the necessity of heeding my Brother's advice that day. Re-adjusting priorities will work and so I am. Having been subsequently advised to forgo degree work because I am keeping others from participating and need to give them a chance, will be difficult to do until the playing field is level as we are taught at the closing of every Blue Lodge.

The Dalai Lama once said: Old friends pass away, new friends appear. It is just like the days. An old day passes, a new day arrives. The important thing is to make it meaningful: a meaningful friend - or a meaningful day."

Hmmmmmmmmmm!

PARKING GARAGE RULES

REUNIONS: Parking is allowed in any open spot in the basement, 2nd or 3rd floors.

STATED MEETINGS: Parking AFTER 5PM is allowed in any open space in the basement, 2nd or 3rd floors, providing the space does NOT have a "RESERVED" sign. Parking is NOT ALLOWED on the 1st floor 45-minute spaces or in any space in the basement, 2nd and 3rd floors that has a "RESERVED" sign or is a double-length space. Unauthorized cars parked in those spaces may be towed at the owner's expense. In the event there are no unreserved spaces available, you may park in the lot just to the east of the consistory building AFTER 5 PM. Access to that lot is on Logan Street, just north of 13th Avenue.

SPECIAL EVENTS: Scheduled and announced in advance are similar to stated meetings in that no parking is allowed in a "RESERVED" or double-length space.

<u>ALL OTHER TIMES</u>: Parking is authorized only in the spaces on the 2nd floor that are designated as being reserved for Denver Consistory and ONLY FOR THE SPECIFIED INDIVIDUALS, unless authorized in advance by the specified individual or the Denver Consistory office. You MUST have either a yellow Denver Consistory Parking pass on your dash or a Denver Consistory Parking decal affixed to your driver's side windshield.
