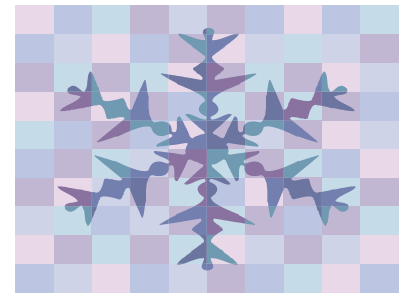

EDITOR'S NOTE: Brother Wayne Anderson has been a close friend for twenty-some years now. He has published what he calls the "Sunday Masonic Paper" over the years covering a wide variety of topics and authors and eras in Masonic thought. This one was particularly timely given our impending New Year. I have taken a small editorial liberty with the piece to remove the mention of specific years within the article. However, the original submission was made on January 1, 2012 by Brother Fred Milliken.

My Masonic New Year's Resolution

Do you believe in coincidences? I don't. Do you believe in Angels? I do. Guess you know where to classify me now.

Before I went to bed on New Year's Eve, I read a piece from a friend and Brother who said that he was going to spend his New Year's day in contemplation of what he had done in the previous year and what he had failed to do and how he could make the new year Masonically better. Did he visit and help Brothers in need often enough? Did he listen and think about those Brothers who had asked his advice and those that had whispered in his ear? Did he walk the extra mile, did he let anyone down?

He asks himself: did I hold true to my values all year long? Did I lose a friend through lack of communication to too much of it? Did I do all that was required of me in time of need? Did I make new friends? Did I create any enemies? Did I leave something undone that I could have finished, and many more questions that I ask of myself?

These are some of the things that he was going to cogitate on:

As we approach the countdown toward the end of the year and the beginning of a New Year, it is a time many use for some reflection! I just wanted to remind everyone that although Masonry is well-known as a "Progressive Science" it should also be remembered as a "Reflective Science."

The true purpose and value in Masonry is to gain knowledge of oneself, and his own relationship with God.

We must use our Lodge time as a place to think, to consider our fellow-man, to become "Human" and to gain "Wisdom."

Looking inward is the place to begin, evaluate shortcomings with respect to our obligations, our charges, and our commitment to the working tools of each degree.

Brotherhood is our vision in Masonry. How well do you know your Lodge and District Brothers?

Buddha taught: Man is so entangled in the "Tragedy of Life," they are bound together out of sympathy in a "Brotherhood of pity..." Zoroaster taught: That Men are Brethren because they are warriors in a battle between "Light and Darkness" - a "Brotherhood of Battle..." Confucius: Brothers because of "common obligations," or a "Brotherhood of Service."

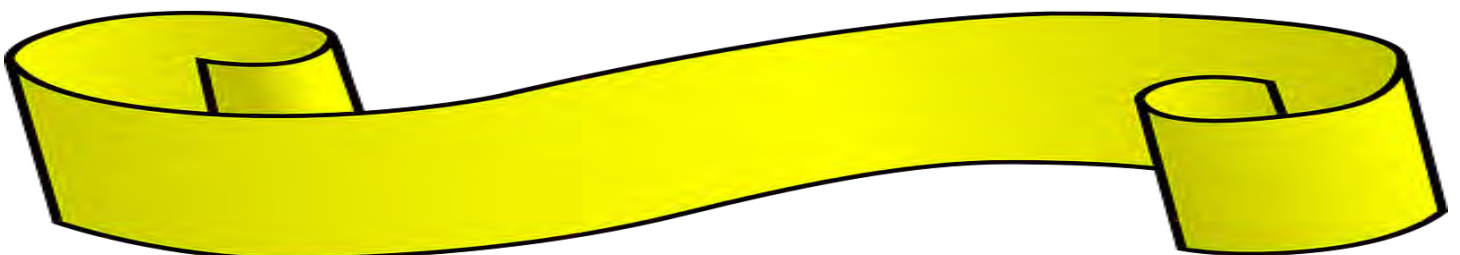
In my practice of religion, I am quite familiar with "centering prayer" which is much like meditation. You take a symbol, a phrase, an idea, or a short scripture reading and you meditate on it for hours, making sure you clear your mind of all else. You contemplate the thought you have chosen, repeating it over and over and listening for an answer. If your mind wanders on to something else, you force it back - often by repeating out loud your chosen thought. Over and over, hour after hour, until you have an answer. Where the answer comes from, I am not going to get into. That is up to your own personal belief system.

So, not believing in coincidences and getting pushed by my Angel, I decide to do some Masonic centering prayer/meditation on the Masonic symbol of the Point Within A Circle.

I cleared my mind of everything but the Point Within A Circle and began. Soon, I found myself in a closed maze where I went around and around. At one end, I bumped into St. John the Baptist, and at another end the Holy Scriptures, and at a third point St. John the Evangelist. But what was the message? What were they trying to tell me? Over and over I pondered and meditated.

After some time it was clear to me that I was being strongly urged to make a Masonic New Year's Resolution—a commitment to accomplish something in the coming year. But further meditation yielded no clue as to what that Masonic New Year's Resolution should be. This was not going to be as easy as I thought.

Maybe this is where free will comes in? It's all up to me. But, I am not sure what I should choose. Perhaps you have some suggestions?

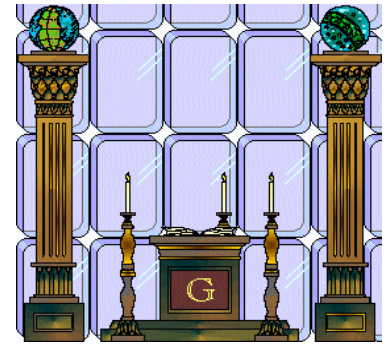

THE PRELATE'S PULPIT

In ancient Roman Religion, Janus is the god of beginnings and endings, gates and doors. He is shown with two faces - one looking to the future and one looking to the past. The double-headed eagle is the primary symbol of the Scottish Rite. It has several meanings. For me, it represents one body, one head looking to the future and one head looking to the past. It also represents the East and West parts of the Roman Empire coming together, the uniting of matter and spirit, faith, and reason - temporary and eternal. The eagle is symbolic of strength and majesty. It calls us to reach higher.

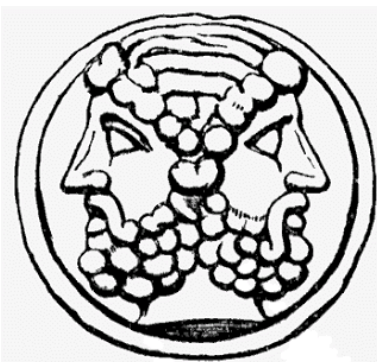

Sound, lights & video are heavily utilized in the reunions to enhance the presentations of the degree work.

Lights add drama and feel to the presentations. Lighting can set the mood, indicate the time of day, or direct the audience attention toward (or away from) action on the floor or stage. Lighting can also provide special effects to “wake up” a scene.

Sound provides microphone support for the actors and choirs, ensuring everyone can hear all of the important lessons being taught by the allegorical stories and lectures. Sound also provides music and sound effects critical to the storytelling.

Video provides an “electronic Trestleboard” through which the lecturers can communicate their important truths, as well as enhancements to the mythological storytelling.

The Men in Black also support the numerous rentals by Masonic bodies and outside groups that use the cathedral, providing technical support, lights, sound and video to meetings, weddings, concerts, funerals and performing groups in the auditorium.

All and all, we manage to keep busy.

But, we are currently in need of more help!

It takes many hands to quickly outfit a whole cast with microphones and keep those microphones in good working order, set lights, set up and take down equipment. Skilled operators are needed for both the sound and light boards, as well as computer savvy operators for sound effects and video/PowerPoints.

You do not need any experience to join this crew. We can train you from scratch, or maybe you can teach us a thing or two! All it takes is an interest and some free time to give to the Consistory.

Working A-V is a rewarding experience. You can contribute to the valuable lessons being taught without having to memorize lines! Since we work “live” in the auditorium during the degrees, you get to participate in and learn from every degree being presented, enhancing your own Masonic experience as well as that of the class!
