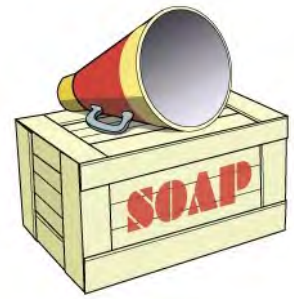
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EDITOR'S CORNER

Brothers All:

Certainly you have been watching the news about the flooding in the area in and around Baton Rouge. The area extends to the west and south to Iberia, St Mary, Acadia, Lafayette, Vermilion, Assumption, Terrebonne, Iberville and Ascension Parishes. To the east, Livingston Parish is basically a lake. Areas north and east in East Feliciana, St Helena and Tangipahoa Parishes have a great deal of flooding. Portions of other southern Parishes are affected. Much of East Baton Rouge Parish is flooded.

The Baton Rouge Scottish Rite had four feet of water yesterday. Most of the Masonic Lodges in the area have suffered flooding. These are buildings that have things in them - some things that we cherish, but things. As Masons, we are in the people - Brotherhood business, not in the 'thing' business. Baton Rouge's General Secretary, Ill. Jimmie Dean Dunkin, had seven feet of water in his home.

We have Brothers who are without homes, cars, clothes, food, work places, churches, and do not know what today or tomorrow will bring - many have lost almost everything.

As the water begins to go down slowly, we need to remember who we are as Masons. Caring for each other, offering assistance and stretching forth that hand of charity. Many pull back when the word 'charity' is used, but we need to realize what we can offer as help, aid and assistance.

The Scottish Rite Supreme Council is placing an appeal nation-wide that will very likely result in financial contributions and offers to assist in many ways. We need to identify who needs help. We need to go and make sure that we give that help. In the next several days, it will become more apparent the great loss and devastation, and we each need to make contact and check on each other, make note of those needing help, and get the word back to our Leadership.

I have asked that all donations be channeled through our Louisiana Scottish Rite Foundation, Inc. (P O Box 64, Shreveport, LA 71161) and that it is noted for "Flood Relief". Please notify me, your Valley Personal Representative and General Secretary, if you know of anyone who needs assistance - we will be offering assistance to individuals and families, not Lodges or buildings.

Let us do our duty as good Scottish Rite Masons should, as Masonic Brothers, as Children of our GOD - Fraternally, Bill

Greetings Brethren! My name is Hunter McCallum, and I am the new Chairman of the Library Committee. Upon taking up this new role, I find we currently have the same few Brothers who use the library for either personal reading or research. My goal is to bring more of you through our doors to use this wonderful resource we have. Currently, we are home to one of the largest Masonic Book collections in the State of Colorado, so this goal should be very achievable.

While the collection does contain many books related to the Scottish Rite, they also cover a wide variety of other topics. There are many books on the formation of the Blue Lodges and Early History of Freemasonry. One of these books is “The Four Old Lodges,” which covers the details of the original lodges in England before the formation of the UGLE, and contains a record of progress and of the career of those lodges through the year 1813.

Another interesting read is “Freemasonry’s Royal Secret: The Jamaican ‘Francken Manuscript’ of the High Degrees.” This book details the translations of Brother Henry Andrew Francken, who performed the original translation of these degrees with the earliest references stating that the texts originally belonged to an old Jewish family in Jamaica. The contents of the degrees are very well detailed and include other degrees not related to the Scottish Rite, including a variation of the York Rite’s “Select Master” degree, and a reputedly Irish version of the “Knight of the Royal Arch” degree.

For those Masons who are currently working their way through the Officer Line in their Blue Lodge, one book that may be helpful is “The Master’s Book” by Bro. Carl H. Claudy. While a bit dated (written in the 50’s), the book covers many interesting topics in regards to running a lodge. From the recommendation to read the prior proceedings of the Grand Lodge and knowing the rules according to the Book of Constitutions, to advice on how to keep the brethren interested in attending lodge, this “pocket-sized” book contains a wealth of knowledge for anyone who may be interested in the advice of another Past Master.

Our library does use a checkout system using index cards on the desk by the computer. If you do choose to borrow a book, please fill out your information on the card so we can contact you should another Brother be interested in borrowing that book. I do hope to see many of you over the next several months as we come back from our break over the summer.

At the September meeting of Denver Consistory, six graduate students will be recognized as the 2016 recipients of the \$5,000 Dwight A. Hamilton Scottish Rite Foundation Graduate Scholarships in Speech-Language Pathology.

Since the Foundation’s scholarship program began in 2005, 58 students have been recipients and a total of \$290,000 has been awarded over those twelve years.



Dr. Rosemary McKnight, a graduate student at CU-Boulder and originally from Scotland, has a degree in medicine from the University of Edinburgh.

Since permanently relocating to Colorado in 1995, her professional activities have included that of a family resource consultant and serving on a variety of governance committees in local K-8 schools, Rosemary’s goals are to serve children in the school setting and through private practice in Colorado. Her aspiration is to educate future SLP graduate students.

Anna Meihaus, a native of California, is a graduate student at CU-Boulder. She has a Bachelor’s Degree in Speech, Language, and Hearing Science from CU.

As a graduate student, Anna has worked with all age groups and has found the most joy in delivering family-centered practice to the very young. Her stated desire is to support young children and their families in an early intervention setting, incorporating family education and support in a culturally-appropriate manner.



Hannah Mellman is a graduate student at CU-Boulder. As a high school student and a volunteer for an organization, she was paired with an energetic four-year-old boy with autism. It was that experience which impressed her in truly beginning to understand the power of communication.

Before attending CU-Boulder, she was a behavioral therapist for children with autism. Relating back to when that little four-year-old boy spoke the words “Say bye-bye to the yellow bus,” Hannah says: “That experience set me on a path towards wanting to enhance the language experience for all children, regardless of their unique needs.”



Jenah Newman is a graduate student at CU-Boulder. She graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Television, Radio, Film, and Theater and subsequently worked in many areas across the U.S. and its territories.

Through these many experiences, she decided to follow in her mother's footsteps by pursuing a career in speech-language pathology. Her special interest is in serving the cleft lip and palate population.

Chloe Shaw is a graduate student at CU-Boulder. She is a native of Manitou Springs, Colorado and tells us that her passions and goals have always revolved around working with children. She was motivated by the impact her parents had on her, both of whom were teachers.

Chloe has worked for a company that teaches standard American English accents and has provided therapy services for children at two pre-schools.



Sai Rajopadhye is a graduate student at the University of Northern Colorado. Her speech-language pathologist career aspirations include providing feeding and swallowing therapy to medically fragile infants as well as in-home early intervention speech and language therapy to children from birth to three.

One of her young clients, for example, is a shy and reserved child who is beginning to come out of his shell as she uses her creativity to motivate him. His mother says that she has not seen her son as engaged as he now is in therapy.

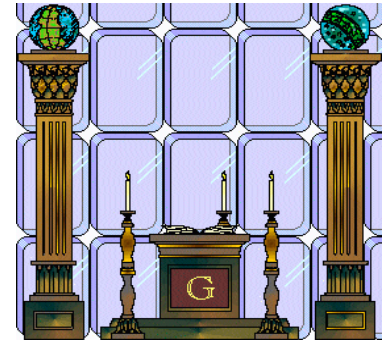
