

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


From the Secretary's Desk

How to Improve Myself in Masonry Through Philanthropy

As we continue to strive with our charitable actions, it benefits us to analyze the meaning of the words we practice. The meaning of charity and philanthropy have similar and sometimes different connotations. Being charitable is the help given to the poor either individually or by an organization. It can be an act or feeling of benevolence. Maybe, it is as simple as the forbearance in judging others. Within theology, it is the benevolence of God towards man. Typically, Freemasonry acts with charity by good will or Brotherly love. On the other hand, being philanthropic is focused more toward mankind and perhaps has the act of charity within itself. Moreover, philanthropy is the effort to increase the well-being of mankind. Increasing the well-being of mankind could be practiced with a charitable donation or an act of love towards mankind in general. The word philanthropic is a combination of two Latin words: Philo— meaning "loving" and Anthropo - meaning "mankind;" thus, we have "loving mankind." The true philanthropist loves mankind and gives to the less fortunate without the hope or expectation of reward, for charity shall cover the multitude of sins.¹

As the Candidate for our Fraternity proceeds as all others have done who have gone that way before him, he is taught to have fervent charity. Sometimes there is a difficulty of being engaged to give to mankind and we inadvertently develop obstacles by our personal habits or disorganization. For example, most people have traveled by airplane. When the flight attendant addresses the passengers regarding their safety procedures, they remind the passengers to first apply the oxygen mask to themselves before helping other passengers. Without oxygen, we are incapable of helping mankind on the airplane during an emergency requiring oxygen deployment. Similarly, we are inept, if we have not managed our personal finances or use our twenty-four-inch gauge effectively before we help mankind.

To improve ourselves, we can seek out new or revisit old tools to develop our financial progression and time management. As we work towards our financial freedoms of perhaps no debt and develop our time management, we can, of course, continue to help mankind in a greater sense. This can be handled in a multitude of ways. One way a philanthropist can accelerate helping mankind is to have an effective plan. Possibly one financial planning tool could be the book, *The Total Money Make Over* by Dave Ramsey,² which has a path to become debt-free with our discipline. Another possibility is to develop our own financial tool

With the free financial principles available or other trusted resources. We can also develop an estate will to hand off our assets to mankind after we have completed our earthly labors. When dealing with our time management, there are many ways to manage our time in today's electronic age, which should almost be a 'no excuse' to our ability to help mankind. Although maybe we can obtain more help through the program developed by Dr. Stephen Covey's book, <u>7 Habits of Highly Effective People</u>³. When these many tools are applied effectively, we can organize our time and money to contribute to the most good of mankind.

There are additional means we can contribute or encourage ideas for ways to give to mankind. A few of those contributions could result in saying a prayer of comfort for those in the most need. Consider financial contributions to the Scottish Rite Almoner's Fund⁴ and recommend someone we may comfort in distress. Take into account, our visible existence as Scottish Rite Masons in Denver by financially supporting the Scottish Rite Masonic Center Endowment Fund⁵. Maybe we can simply volunteer our time to contribute during the Reunion, help out at the Ladies Luncheon, or last, but not least, attend the very important Calling Committee.

So, where is Masonry today contributing philanthropically? As identified on the Colorado Grand Lodge website, Masonic charity has often been 'quiet' as compared to civic charities and a researcher can only capture the data from formal Masonic activities and even this information does not give a complete explanation. "For example, the Masonic Service Association quietly oversees a Hospital Visitation Program with a goal that every Veteran's Administration Hospital in the United States has a Masonic volunteer working with patients. How can a value be placed on the more than 500,000 hours a year spent on this work? In 2006, American Masonic Philanthropy was estimated at \$525 Million, or \$1.4 Million PER DAY!

In closing my Brethren, we can all better develop our philanthropic personalities; incidentally, the easiest philanthropy we can do is spending time with our Brethren sharing Brotherly love and joy with each of us as well as leaving more light within us. This perhaps is the best giving and most remembered to mankind that can be bestowed. We can have that chance at a minimum of twenty Blue Lodge evenings per year and ten Scottish Rite evenings per year plus our beautiful Reunions, and may we all make the best of those evenings. And now, "...abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity." ⁷

THE PRELATE'S PULPIT

I have fond memories of Memorial Day. When I was a child, I can remember early Memorial Day morning my mother cutting flowers from her garden. She would cover Mason jars with foil and arrange the flowers in the jars, adding water when we arrived at the Netawaka Cemetery. We decorated the graves of family members and departed friends. Currently, Memorial Day is the unofficial beginning of the summer season. Memorial Day began as "Decoration Day" which became a national holiday in 1868. It was observed as a day to remember those members of the Armed Forces who gave their lives in the service of our nation. Groups place a flag beside every grave in many of our national cemeteries. Americans flock to the cemeteries to place flowers and wreaths on the graves of loved ones.

According to a recent article in the Scottish Rite Journal, Brother John A. Logan, 32°, is credited with creating Decoration Day, which is our current Memorial Day, which is observed on the last Monday of May. Today, it is the three-day weekend when Americans flock to the campgrounds, have cookouts, and enjoy the outdoors. However, we should never forget our fallen Americans who gave their greatest give to us, their lives. Let us also remember that Brother Major General John A Logan ordered that May 30 be set aside as a day to place flowers on the graves of Union men who lost their lives in the Civil War.

On May 30, let us pause to remember the life of Brother John Logan and all those men and women of our Armed Forces. Let us also remember our departed brothers and their family members. This year I decorated the graves of my grandfather Harris and my uncle Curt who were both Masons. They are buried in the Masonic section of Crown Hill Cemetery. One day, my wife and I will lay beside them.

I leave you with this:

This is the beginning of a New Day.

God has given me this day to use as I will.

I can waste it or grow in its light and be of service to others.

But what I do with this day is important because I have exchanged it

For a day of my life.

When tomorrow comes, today will be gone forever. I hope I will not regret the price I paid for it.

I remember my mother saying, "All I ask is to be remembered."

The Volume of the Sacred Law - and the Lord's Prayer

Many, if not most, of us grew up at a time when the Lord's Prayer was said daily in schools. I think most of us still remember the words - if not by heart, then by rote. However, have you ever wondered IF, just perhaps, the translation from the original Aramaic (the language Jesus of Nazareth spoke) that we use is the "only "one? It turns out, Aramaic, being a "dead" language, is studied by Biblical scholars because they know you have to go back to the SOURCE rather than rely on translations. Because, no matter how good or accurate a translation might be, the old saying "it loses a little in the translation" seems to be more descriptive of those efforts.

The Prayer to Our Father

Oh Thou, from whom the breath of life comes,

Who fills all realms of sound, light and vibration.

May Your light be experienced in my utmost holiest.

Your Heavenly Domain approaches.

Let Your will come true—in the universe (all that vibrates)

As you can see, the same words can be translated in different ways. While similar, they are uniquely different. There are many more translations from the original Aramaic available.

In any case, the second reference will show you how multiple translations from Aramaic to Ancient Greek (not to be confused with Modern Greek) to Latin to Old English, to Middle English, to the King James Version of the Holy Bible, and to a more modern and colloquial English can indeed (and does) change what is said—sometimes quite significantly.

And, while the KJV is considered by many scholars to be the epitome of prose and poetry, it is also wise to remember that King John charged many Biblical scholars with the job of translating the various source documents - and he, as King, reserved the right to accept or reject any of the translations made by those scholars—and have them try again to please his Majesty with their work. That may well be why it took them so long to compile the entire book.

FYI, our English word "BIBLE" stems from the Latin "Bibliotheca" or "biblia" - meaning "the books" or "little papyrus books"- or collection, which refers to the various books of the Bible as a collection of writings from various authors.

The ancient Greek version of the Old Testament originated in the 2nd or 3rd century B.C. Legend has it that it was composed by seventy scribes over a century of work translating from the Original Hebrew and Aramaic texts. Attributed to the divine inspiration of these seventy scribes, it is often referred to as the "Septuagint" - an expression Hellenistic Jews used to describe their sacred books.

There followed a number of Latin translations, the most notable of which was the Vulgate, used in many churches over the centuries. By 1961, the Holy Bible, in whole or in part, had been translated into more than 1,151 languages, most of these during the 19th and 20th centuries, and including one called the Biblia Pauperum (picture books for the illiterate in the Middle Ages). The King James Version of 1611 is widely known as the noblest monument of English Prose and competed at the time of its creation with the Geneva Bible. The Revised Standard Version, the New International Version, the New American Standard Bible, and the World English Bible are but a few of the literally countless English version of this Sacred text available today.

But, the Holy Bible is more than a historical document to be preserved. And, it is more than a classic of English Literature to be cherished and admired. It is our accepted record of God's dealings with mankind, of God's revelation of Himself, and His instructions to humanity. It is, in other words, the inestimable gift of God to man.

Symbolizing Truth, Faith, and Hope, it is thus fitting that we give due respect and a singular place of honor on our altars to that Volume of the Sacred Law which represents the many religions of the world comprising the Masonic family, and which proves that people of all faiths, creeds, and nationalities MAY indeed travel the road of life together in harmony as friends.

Let that bond of friendship between men and women of differing religions found in our Masonic family and symbolized by the concept of the Volume of the Sacred Law remind us daily of our "Best Friends Forever (BFF)" as we journey down the highway of life together.

It is interesting to note that in other countries, it is quite common to see more than one VSL on the altar during a meeting. A long-time friend of mine, Wayne Anderson, of Ontario

used to travel internationally quite regularly with his job. Many of his travels took him to Malaysia (Lodge Tulabardine in the East - a Scottish Constitution Lodge) where he witnessed multiple VSL's carried into the lodge by the Bearer.


They were:

- 1. King James Version of the Holy Bible (Christianity)
- 2. Qur'an Islam—laid on the pillow by a member of the Islamic faith.
- 3. Tripitaka Buddism
- 4. Rigveda Hindu
- 5. Bhagavad Gita Hindu
- 6. The Kojiki Shinto Buddism
- 7. Guru Granth Sahib Sikkism
- 8. Confucianism—they have no Holy Book per se, but a list of rules—this was represented by a roll of paper.

My friend asked which Holy Book was held over the candidate's head as he took his obligation and each religion has their own specific practices. In the particular case when he visited the first time, it was a Hindu candidate and the book was held by another Hindu Brother as they believe the eye to the soul is in the center of the forehead.

As you can see, traditions and forms of Masonry differ depending on jurisdiction and location in the world, and sometimes they can be quite different from what you might experience in your own "back yard" lodges.



MAJOR CHANGES TO KING SOOPERS GIFT CARD PROGRAM

AS OF MARCH 31st there were big changes to the King Soopers gift card program which has been so beneficial to the Scottish Rite. Here are the major points:

- 1. While the gift cards are still good and will remain so for paying for purchases at King Soopers, only those reloads that were made before March 31, 2019, benefit the Scottish Rite. After that date, if you reload your gift card, the Scottish Rite will receive no benefit. Moreover, after March 31st, you can not use the gift card to pay for gasoline.
- 2. Beginning April 1st, King Soopers ties benefits to charity (including the Scottish Rite) to their King Soopers Sooper Card (Rewards Card). We have been assigned a new NPO (Non-Profit Organization) number: EM386.
- 3. Our members must reapply for a new rewards card at any King Soopers store if you wish to continue to benefit the Scottish Rite. You will be given a form to fill out. It will ask for your home address and a telephone number. BUT KEEP THIS IN MIND: The home address can only be linked to ONE charity. So, if you are married and your spouse wants to benefit your church or a school and you want to benefit the Scottish Rite, you must list a different address and phone number than your spouse does. We suggest you list the Scottish Rite address (1370 Grant Street, Denver, Colorado 80203) as your address and your cell phone number. THEN BRING THE FORM TO THE SCOTTISH RITE OFFICE AND WE WILL INSERT THE CODE TO LINK YOUR CARD TO THE SCOTTISH RITE. If you have a vacation home or a rental in Colorado, you can use that address.
- 4. Thereafter, when you shop at King Soopers and check out, key in your Sooper Card (Rewards Card) or insert your cell phone number, and pay the bill with a credit card. The Scottish Rite will receive a financial benefit from all such purchases without it costing you anything.
- 5. To benefit the Consistory as a charity, after you get your new rewards card, go to your computer and go to the King Soopers website (www.kingsoopers.com).
- a) at the top of the screen to the right of the King Soopers symbol, click your mouse on "Save"
- b) At the bottom of the drop-down, click on "King Soopers Community Rewards"
- c) On the next screen, click on "Enroll Now" then click on "Create an Account"
- d) Fill this out: Your ZIP Code location; Pick your favorite King Soopers store; Put your email in twice; Create a password (write it down for future use); Put in your first and last name; Insert your phone number; click on "CreateAccount" and ...
- e) Pick Your Charity—Hopefully, the Scottish Rite Masonic Center at 1370 Grant Street.
