This issue may well reach you a bit late. I'm up in Montana seeing to my daughter who is recovering from some significant foot surgery. So, I hope you understand my regular schedule is somewhat "flexible" and "interesting" at the moment. Not sure when I'll get home.

Please take a moment to read Brother Dan Conway's piece on "Surrogation" in this issue. This continues a discussion that I started back in November when I examined the overall TREND of membership numbers in the U.S. and Canada over many decades.

What is important in Dan's exposition is that NUMBERS do not tell the WHOLE story. They are an important part of the story, but there is always "the rest of the story" that needs to be examined.

Certainly, membership NUMBERS are significant INDICATORS of viability - if you don't have enough to carry on the business of the lodge (or organization), it dies. We see that constantly in Lodge mergers and turning in charters when no other lodge is available to merge with.

But, equally important are the numbers of ACTIVE members—not just dues-paying members—because the dues paying members help you stay financially afloat, but the ACTIVE members are where you get traction with your MISSION.

Remember, if the mission is to ENGAGE with the public and your potential membership clients, you have to reach out—and how you do that is something that will differ from lodge to lodge, jurisdiction to jurisdiction, and community to community—regardless of your numbers.

Our late Brother Gerry Screws always said "membership is a CONTACT SPORT" - and he meant it. You have to be willing to do whatever it takes to play the game. Engage your prospects, but more importantly—look at the overall picture—your current members can't be overlooked and forgotten. They're a resource you can't replace at any price. Engage them!

Keep the dialogue going. Brainstorming is something we all need to do—regardless of our organization. I'm stealing from III. Brother Matt Raia's membership statistics he gave me:

January 2019: 1857 January 2020: 1795 (-62)

So, "surrogation" or not, the numbers don't lie.





## **SURROGATION**

# Venerable Master, Centennial Lodge of Perfection

The November issue of *RiteWorks* included an excellent article written by Illustrious Brother Bill Hickey in which he presents some compelling historical data on Masonic membership and offers some very astute observations on what that data tells us. If you haven't already, I would encourage you to read his article. One statement in particular stood out to me, and it is one I'd like to examine a bit further because over my 22 years as a Mason, I've heard it espoused many times, in various forms. Our Illustrious Brother comments: "these are facts ... you can not argue facts." He further adds: "you cannot deny from the numbers we see here that Masonry membership is on a decline." To clarify, Illustrious Brother Hickey does not state that *Masonry* is on a decline, rather *membership* is on a decline. Unfortunately, most of us don't make that distinction..

He is correct, there is no arguing the fact that the number of members has steadily declined since the late 1950's. However, I would like you to take a moment to consider a phenomenon that undermines many organizations and one that is especially pervasive in Freemasonry - *surrogation*.

Surrogation is a cognitive bias that can best be described by the adage, "when a measure becomes the target, it ceases to be a good measure." Metrics are a way for us to give tangible form to something that is inherently abstract so that our minds can grasp it more readily. But what happens when this metric replaces the thing it was meant to measure? What happens when an organization loses sight of its objective and instead focuses on the metric that is meant to simply represent it?

Ask yourself, how many times have you heard, or even said yourself, in a Lodge meeting, "we've got to get our numbers up," or "if we don't get more members, we won't be able to pay the bills?" Yes, our membership numbers are down, but what has happened is that our focus has become misplaced, and our increasingly limited time and energy is being spent on the wrong thing - improving the metric itself.

Consider for a moment how much of our efforts are spent getting new petitions and initiating new members. Now consider how much of our efforts are spent on **engaging the members we DO have**, and how much of our efforts are spent on promoting and advancing the message of Freemasonry in our community and the world at large. Is there an imbalance present? Tracking our membership numbers goes a long way to tell us how we may be doing, but it should not be our **only** measure. What about tracking how long our members stay with

the Fraternity, or how many offices they hold, or how many committees they serve on, or how many initiatives each member takes on? Membership figures should not be our principal metric, and more importantly, they should not be our goal.

The "fact" is that we spend a disproportionate amount of effort on getting and initiating new members compared to improving the experience for our existing members. **The result is a membership experience that is contrary to our objectives.** We have fallen into the surrogation trap. Surrogation is a very common subconscious bias and it is difficult to avoid because we, as humans, have the mental tendency to gravitate toward the tangible, the knowable, and avoid the abstract and the unknowable.

So, how do we prevent surrogation? How do we get out of this trap? Well, we must have an understanding of how it occurs in the first place. Nobel prize winner Daniel Kahneman and Yale professor Shane Frederick postulate that **THREE CONDITIONS** are necessary for surrogation to take hold:

- 1. The objective, or strategy, is fairly abstract.
- 2. The metric of the strategy is concrete and conspicuous.
- 3. The individual accepts, at least subconsciously, the substitution of the metric for the strategy.

Just as fire is extinguished when heat, fuel, or oxygen is removed, so too can surrogation be addressed if one or more of these factors are avoided or eliminated. With Freemasonry, we obviously cannot eliminate our objectives and it is impossible to control the subconscious of individuals, so the most plausible solution is **to stop looking to membership numbers as a measure of success or failure,** or at a minimum, begin giving a variety of measures equal consideration so that no one single measure becomes the surrogate for our goals.

Is "surrogation" a new word for you? Look it up in the dictionary. It's a psychological phenomenon in which the measure(s) of a construct of interest (in this case, membership) evolve to replace the construct itself (Freemasonry). An everyday example of surrogation is a manager who is tasked with increasing customer satisfaction and begins to believe that the customer satisfaction survey score actually is customer satisfaction. So, now that you know what the word means, what word is an "antonym" (opposite) of surrogation? You'll find that most dictionaries and thesauruses use the word "biological" - because "surrogate" tends to refer to a case where a person is a surrogate parent or substitute parent. There is no satisfactory antonym for surrogation that helps you understand what might be the opposite behavior being described in the definition above. Words like: proxy, stand-in, alternate, fill-in, makeshift, replacement, representative, stop gap, pinch hitter, and substitute agent are synonyms for surrogate. But words like permanent and real—which show up as possible antonyms just don't seem to work well in this context. Read Dan's article again - and see if you don't come to the same conclusion about metrics.

# Deputy Grand Master Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Masons in Colorado



Brother Mike Moore is a familiar face to the Brothers in his role as former Chairman of the Class Committee of the Denver Consistory, and also as the newly elected Deputy Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Masons in Colorado. It was my honor and pleasure to spend a couple of hours with Mike at his home, interviewing him for this Member Spotlight.

Brother Mike grew up in central and southern Illinois and has been in Colorado for about 37 years. He and his lovely wife, Denise, have five daughters - two from Denise's first marriage and three from Mike's first marriage. Mike and Denise have seven grandkids and have been happily married for more than 18 years. Denise is semi-retired and is the church organist and choir director for their church. She also is the Secretary of the Denver Rocky Mountain Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. Mike emphasized several times during our talk about how supportive Denise is of his Masonic labors and how appreciative he is for that support. Mike has been successfully self-employed as a house painter for the past 37 years. It speaks well to Mike's character and quality of work to note that he has not advertised his business for more than 30 years, but rather has relied upon very favorable word-of-mouth recommendations from his clients. Mike has also painted in several Lodge rooms over the years—Parkhill #148, South Denver #93, the Lodge room at the Denver Consistory, and just recently Fort Lupton #119.

Mike was raised a Master Mason on April 8, 2006 in Englewood Lodge #166, AF&AM. He served as Worshipful Master of his Lodge in 2011. Englewood #166 is merging with Liberty #134 and the new Lodge will be known as New Frontier Lodge #134. Mike joined the Scottish Rite soon after becoming a Master Mason and was a 2011 Scottish Rite Fellow. He served as the Commander of the Council of Kadosh in 2014. Mike was also a District Lecturer for nearly two years and was invited to join the Grand Line by PGM Mike McMillan in 2014. Mike was one of the first Brothers to complete the Master Craftsman program and has completed the College of the Consistory course out of Guthrie. In addition to serving as Class Committee Chairman, he has done significant archiving work for the Denver Consistory and he wrote a monthly column for RiteWorks - "Between the Columns" - for several years. He also has served the Fraternity as a member of the Grand Lodge speakers Bureau, averaging about 15 talks per year. Mike served on the Children's Hospital Appraisal Committee for three years. He recently was made an Honorary Member of Denver-Fitzsimons Chapter #37, National Sojourners.

Now that you have a little knowledge of Mike's family and Masonic background, let's look at the very interesting aspects of this multi-talented man.

- Mike was a High school All-American wrestling champion. He has held the record for most varsity wins - 120 - at his high school for more than 40 years. He qualified for the state championships three consecutive years. Mike went to the Olympic Freestyle Training Camp in 1977.
- Mike is an avid outdoorsman and mountain man re-enactor. He has canoed more than 500 miles, usually with one or two canoeing partners, in primitive conditions and in wilderness areas. His regular canoe partner is a subcontractor with NASA, working on the outside windows and heat shield on the space shuttle program. An interesting man with very interesting friends! He has made his own buckskin clothes and is a black powder shooter. He holds the highest ranking awarded in the American Mountain Men, a national survival re-enactor organization.
- Mike recently has taken up the Ham radio hobby and holds the highest license class available to amateur radio operators Amateur Extra. He builds his own antennas and has talked with operators in about two-thirds of the countries in the world. His callsign is KEØLRD.
- He is a self-taught mandolin player.
- Mike is an accomplished astronomer and astro-photographer. He has seven telescopes, several of which he built himself and has more than 500 hours of viewing time. He often views from his back yard, but prefers the mountain areas, particularly the South Park region.
- In 2011 Mike received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Tesoro Foundation. The Tesoro Foundation ("Tesoro" means "treasurer" in Spanish) is committed to protecting and making available to the community the artistic treasures of our American past. All Tesoro events are inspired by Colorado's rich history and shared experiences with Southwest, Spanish, Mexican, Native American, African-American, and early European cultures. From art and cuisine to historical re-enactments and music, the Tesoro foundation's mission is to create community-based events and educational programs designed to enrich and celebrate our diverse cultural heritage.
- He is an accomplished author, having written seven books. Four of these are non-fiction
  accounts of the early American West and three are Masonic Almanacs. He has published
  more than 130 articles nationally, primarily on the early American West, but also in
  Plumbline a quarterly research publication of the Scottish Rite Research Society.
- Mike was featured on the History Channel in a program entitled "Jedediah Smith and the Opening of the West." He maintains an internet database of more than 5,000 names of persons in the Early American West and where to find further information on each of them <a href="http://mtmen.org/mtman/html/names/namesv3.pdf">http://mtmen.org/mtman/html/names/namesv3.pdf</a>. He appeared as the "talking head" on a Vimeo video produced by WB Carl Hartman entitled "Freemasonry in the Early West."

#### Remembrance and Renewal - A Peek Under the Tent

As we move towards our annual Remembrance and Renewal celebration which takes place on April 20<sup>th</sup>, it seem fitting to take a closer look at how this came about.

It is often held that the first known reference to the Scottish Rite's Remembrance and Renewal ceremony came to be in 1856 through a version of the 18<sup>th</sup> Degree Rose Croix ritual penned by Charles Laffon de Ladebat. Charles was born in Jamaica in 1807 to a family that was active in the plantation trade. His life there was disrupted in the Black revolt of 1831, a slave uprising also known as the Baptist War or Christmas Rebellion. Beginning on Christmas day of 1831 and lasting for eleven days, the leader and Baptist Minister, Samuel Sharpe, sought freedom and a working wage for the enslaved plantation worker. British forces quickly crushed Sharpe's forces with heavy loss of life, and de Ladebat, now 24, made his way to New Orleans by way of Baltimore.

The Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal borrowed heavily from the more religious observance of Maundy Thursday, which occurs on the Thursday before Easter Sunday. Ten years later, in 1866, the Code of Statutes identifies Maundy Thursday as a feast day and by 1878 it was recorded that the observance was mandatory.

In 1994, to better address the changing needs of the Scottish Rite brethren, it was decided that the Maundy Thursday observance would be replaced by the Celebration of Remembrance and Renewal. It was further determined that it should be administered by the Chapter of Rose Croix and that it take place on, or as near as practicable, to the Vernal Equinox. While the contemporary evolution is not considered a religious service, it carries themes that are clearly adapted from Passover and Easter traditions.

In an effort to keep the Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal both relevant and engaging, its presentation by the Rocky Mountain Chapter of Rose Croix is conceptually fluid with regards as to how it is exemplified to the audience each Spring. At a high level, the purpose of the Ceremony is to remember our fellow Knights Rose Croix that fell in the last year and to celebrate the promise of Spring with life renewed through seed and fruit. In 2019, Past Wise Master Ben Williams made significant changes to the way this was shared through visual symbolism and musical enhancements. Based on feedback received, we are largely continuing upon this new concept for 2020, with the addition of other enhancements which time did not allow us to incorporate into the 2019 version.

On behalf of the entire Rose Croix team, officers past and present, we hope you are able to make it out on April 20<sup>th</sup>, that you enjoy the show, and that you are able to take home a new point of positive reflection.

Now 19 years old, Carson has his own company - *Editing on Wheels (*go to www.editingonwheels.com) and is on the staff of Jill Tullman and Associates, LLC - an augmentative and alternative communication Speech-Language Pathology private practice with offices in Centennial and Colorado Springs. Check out his website. Carson has a creative talent and a great personality. He says, "I named my business "Editing on Wheels" because I have Cerebral Palsy and use a power wheelchair. I talk with an app through an iPad, so my communication needs to be via text, email, or in person."

He attended Chatfield High School and loves football. He was the school football team's photographer/videographer. In 2015, he received the *Hero Award* from DDRC (Developmental Disabilities Resource Center) in Lakewood. Here is what DDRC published in their 2015 Annual Report - and it is worth repeating here:

"Carson has used technology to be a leader amongst his peers. While attending Easter Seals, he noticed that another participant was getting bullied by an older camper. Though Carson couldn't physically intervene, he used his speech device to ask the bully how he would like it if someone picked on him for having a disability and that he was just continuing the kind of humiliation they all deal with on a daily basis. He stuck with his new friend who was being bullied to ensure that he was included and respected by the rest of the campers. Carson is an exceptional person and deserving of the prestigious DDRC Hero Award."

Children's Hospital Colorado speech-language pathologists helped him find his voice beginning when he was a young child. At the 2019 TWT Camp, he returned, but not as a camper or a mentor. He was contracted by Children's Hospital Colorado as a film producer and editor in preparing a video of the camp.

Carson Covey is joining our RiteCare team as a RiteCare Ambassador. We will introduce Carson at the 7 p.m. program on Monday evening, February 17, 2020, at Denver Consistory. Please plan to attend and give him a warm and deserved Scottish Rite welcome. This program will be one to remember.




