As we embark upon this “New Year” - in which we aren’t seeing much “new” or “changed” from 2020 (yet), I think it might be appropriate to reflect on some of the changes we’ve been forced to make in our lives—some for the better, and some clearly for the worse. We’ve seen a country divided not just by political affiliation—which has actually been the norm for decades, if not centuries—but also by personal opinions concerning the validity and applicability of scientific facts. In the process of witnessing these tensions, we have discovered something very strange—the concept of “face time” at work really isn’t all that necessary for productivity. ZOOM, GoToMeeting, Teams, and other Peer-to-Peer applications have proliferated and allowed many (but not all) to work from home, to participate in activities from home without spending significant time driving to work or to a meeting where “productivity” can only be called “somewhat lacking.” The air is cleaner, and traffic is generally lighter as a result.

And, as you increase the distance that a person must travel to attend something in person, it is more likely that they will opt to participate VIRTUALLY instead—it not only saves them frustration (and danger) in the commute, but the time they have to spend in the car to get there and then return home when the meeting is over—their personal productive time is wasted in the car. And, organizational productivity hasn’t suffered much in the process (except where physical presence is simply required for something to happen—like throw a switch, unplug something, run cables, and so on).

It begs the question as we enter a new year: If we have been able to continue operating as an institution—albeit in crippled mode—without face-to-face in-person meetings, are they then really necessary? That flies in the face of some of our cherished Masonic traditions—the in person initiatic experience, for example. But, does that mean that EVERY experience in Masonry requires a close-up and personal touch? Pick and choose carefully. Realize that what WE, as the “outgoing” generation in Masonry had as a normal experience may or may not be germane or significant to the next generation ... and it is they, not us, that will carry the Craft forward. Here is where WE (the old geezers) can play an important role—help them understand the significance and importance of in-person contact—but also realize that we too have to make adjustments and allow for some “virtual” activities that heretofore we have expected to conduct “in person.” Maybe that’s the real significance of this “New Year.”

FREEMASONRY—More Than An Association of the Average

In the first place, Freemasonry is Not an association of the average. It contemplates a body of picked men; it demands certain distinctive qualifications of those who seek its fellowship; it insists that those who are admitted to its mysteries shall be worthy and well-qualified; it inquires whether those who stand at its doors are in harmony with its honored past, its accepted principles, and its defined purposes. You could not make a Masonic Lodge out of the first one hundred men you might pick up on the street. That is the reason our doors are so jealously guarded; that is the reason candidates must be vouched for by those who have themselves stood our tests; that is the reason those who join us must take such solemn obligations. No other human organization is intended to pay greater attention to its membership quality; no other organization depends more for its standing and influence in the community upon the quality of its membership.

A second reason for this emphasis on quality is, that no institution is any better than the material out of which it is built. The weakness of many existing organizations is that their specifications call for marble while the material furnished for the building is only mud. If the Masonic Order stands out as one of the great institutions of our civilizations; if it exercises an influence on the social order far beyond its mere numerical strength; the only reason is that it is an association of superior men. In other words, the efficiency of Masonry depends upon the QUALITY of those who are recognized as Masons. The point needs no laboring. Still another reason for regarding this matter of quality is of paramount importance is that every other interest of the Masonic Order depends upon it. It belongs to our fraternity to guard its ancient landmarks, but what do men who lack Masonic character and Masonic spirit care for ancient landmarks? In the keeping of many men our priceless heritage is not an inspiration and an honor; it is a contrast and a reproach; it belongs to Masonry to exemplify certain great principles in life. But we need to remember that principles are only safe in the keeping of men of principle. That is a lesson written large on the pages of our history. It belongs to Masonry to further certain great purposes. Those purposes are unselfish and humanitarian. I am not mistaken when I say that the true Mason will ask: "What can I do?" The spurious Mason will always be asking: "What can I get?" The ties of Brotherhood are so close in Masonry that every opportunity and inducement is offered to the man of mercenary spirit who would prostitute it to personal uses.

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The result is that nearly every Lodge has those who are continually calling upon their brethren to turn their grindstones. There are those who capitalize their membership for business purposes; there are those who capitalize their Masonic affiliations for political ends. Such persons are the pan-handlers of Masonry. Whenever public-spirited citizens in a community begin to shake their heads and say it will be hard to defeat an office-holding barnacle because of his fraternal support, it is high time for those who love the Order to sit up and begin to take notice. Under such circumstances the hallmark of excellence is being erased from the Lodge door.

These words were heard by the Brethren attending the Grand Communication of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of California, in 1914. Brother Matt S. Hughes gave this address as Grand Orator.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



Brother Daniel A. (Dan) Rivers , 32° KCCH

Happy New Year Brothers! We sincerely hope that you had an enjoyable and meaningful holiday season and a Happy New Year despite the pandemic.

This month's Member Spotlight will focus on a Brother that we likely all will know and have worked with in some capacity in Masonry. Brother Dan served the Denver Valley as the Wise Master of the Rocky Mountain Chapter of Rose Croix in 2017 and was a member of the Consistory Finance Committee for a number of years. He was the President of the Denver-Fitzsimons Chapter #37 of the National Sojourners in 2019, the same year that he was Eminent Commander of Coronal-Ascalon Commandery #31 of the Knights Templar of Colorado and the Excellent High Priest of Triad chapter #42 of Royal Arch Masons. He belongs to Denver Council #1 of Cryptic Masons and currently serves as the Illustrious Principle Conductor of the Work. Dan served as Worshipful Master of South Denver #93 in 2010 and is in his third year as Secretary of South Denver #93 - his lodge received the Honor Lodge Award during his year in the East. He was recognized as the Secretary of the Year in 2019 by the Grand Lodge of Colorado. He is indeed a worthy Brother that has made a meaningful commitment to Masonry. It's an honor to know him and to work with him in a variety of ways. During the nearly three hours that Dan and I spent on the phone for this interview, I was constantly impressed with his enthusiasm, his optimism, his willingness to share and his commitment to all things better.

Brother Dan was born and grew up in upstate New York, in Rochester, home of Eastman Kodak. You DO remember Kodak—right? Probably only if you're 40 years old or older—LOL! There was lots of hunting, fishing, and outdoor activities in that area and Dan met his wife Janet there in high school. Dan's father was a Staff Sergeant in the U. S. Marine corps and served in the Pacific Theater in World War II. He passed when Dan was 17 years old. Dan's mother worked at Kodak until retirement and she passed early in 2020. She impressed on Dan a valuable lesson that has served him well throughout his military and professional career—that of ***"Zero Defect Mentality."*** ***That is, do it right, make it right—each time, every time. A great lesson for each of us to learn and practice in our lives.***

Dan has a younger sister that still lives in New York and a half-sister in New York from his father's first marriage. His older brother unfortunately has passed.

While we were talking on the phone last week and I was making notes on Dan's life and career, he mentioned something to me that immediately piqued my interest. The term he used was ***'disruptive innovation.'*** I asked him to explain. The example he gave was that of Eastman Kodak—at one time the largest manufacturer/processor of film for commercial and consumer use. Kodak became THE recognized symbol of photography throughout the world and their future was bright. Then, along came Fuji Film and then digital photography. Kodak went

from being the industry leader and a world-wide household name to a bankrupt and essentially dissolved business in a span of about 20 years or less. Kodak simply could not adapt to the changes occurring every day. Should we, as responsible and caring masons, be studying this example to strengthen our Fraternity? Grand Commander Jim Cole certainly seems to point us in that direction with the new initiative <https://beafreemason.org>. Are ZOOM calls the new norm? Brother Dan can certainly help us in our journey, and I urge you to visit with him about his ideas.

As Secretary of South Denver #93, Dan has been instrumental in bringing in 16 new Masons in 2020—despite the pandemic. The Lodge has 35 candidates waiting for initiation. These men are all being mentored and communicated with on a regular basis. Not unlike our own Journey to the Scottish Rite (J2SR) that has thus far been very well-received and accepted by our Brothers and candidates alike. A critical role he plays in his job as Secretary of the Lodge is to connect the right mentor with each candidate. It's important to have strong communication with each of the candidates and newly raised Masons. Make that man comfortable, not nervous. ***A high stress level is NOT conducive to learning.***

As a straight A student in high school, it's not surprising that Dan immediately began to excel as a "boot" in Marine Corps boot camp. He scored exceptionally high on the electronics tests he was given and was guaranteed an E-2 rating upon graduation from boot camp. His performance was so outstanding in boot camp that he became the Company Guidon Bearer, which promoted him to E-2 in boot camp and graduation as an E-3 Lance Corporal. Within six months, he was given a meritorious promotion to E-4 Corporal and soon after, another meritorious promotion to E-5 Sergeant. For all veterans reading this, you will recognize what a significant achievement this is and how impressive Dan is as a hard worker.

Dan's job in the Marines was to be a "systems guy." That is, to look at processes and see how they can be improved. Don't get stuck on "we've always done it that way." Very similar to Masonry and the adaptations we have made over the years, especially during the 2020 pandemic year. Dan's overriding attitude is that we can do it. Don't make excuses about why we can't do it. And, every day is filled with opportunities—make the best of each opportunity. Dan was fortunate during his military career to serve under officers that recognized his abilities and thoughtfulness. He often found himself as a Staff Sergeant (E-6) sitting in base officers' meetings and being asked for his solution to the day's problem or issue because the Commanding Officer knew him and respected his objective wisdom.

After a military career of more than 22 years, Dan retired and now teaches leadership classes, primarily to DoD and military clients. It was interesting to hear Dan talk about leadership and the associated skills and traits of leadership. He indicated that probably only about 1% of all people have inherent leadership skills. Born leaders, if you will. These people know where to go and how to get there. Another 10% - 15% strive to become leaders. And the other 85% are followers, or sheep. And, many of these are just "zombies" - no clue where to go or how to get there. This comment wasn't made in a derogatory way, it was just an objective statement of fact.

As a leader, it's important to determine who are the "do-ers" and who are the "talk-ers." They each play an important role in an organization's success. The talkers make the sales

pitch. They convince the customer to buy. Or, the man to turn in his petition. Then, the doers take over and ensure customer satisfaction. Or, mentor the man on his Masonic journey. Sometimes the “doer” and the “talker” are the same person. That’s great when it happens, but don’t rely on that being the case each time.

Dan talks about the levels of leadership. Some are assigned as leaders—because of their rank or tenure and not especially because of skills or leadership traits they may possess. Others earn their level of leadership through hard work and achieving the level of competency that they personally want. Others are leaders because of their desire to work with those around them and to see their colleagues advance and be promoted. And still others look at the team, not the individual, and work to make the team successful.

He reflected on his time in the Marines and the fact that the Marine Corps begins teaching leadership skills at the E-2 level and never stops. As an example, Dan points to his 23 Expert rifle Awards. And to his several Navy Achievement and Navy Commendation Awards for achieving and maintaining high levels of effective communication and instilling confidence in his troops. He won numerous drill awards throughout his career. Another example he gave was that of being assigned to Camp Pendleton, a major marine base in California. Camp Pendleton had been operating at about a 60% efficiency rating when Dan arrived. The Base Commander, a Colonel, tasked Dan with looking at the functionality of the Camp. He immediately began communications with all departments, shops, and installations on the base, with a special emphasis on identifying deficiencies, excesses, and shortages. Within just a few months and with a minimal expense of less than \$2 million, Camp Pendleton was operating at a near-100% functionality with virtually no shortages or deficiencies.

When Dan was elected the Secretary of South Denver #93, he made a 5-year commitment to that office. He’s just now entering the third year of that commitment. He developed an SOP (Standard Operating Procedure) for the Secretary’s office. He mentioned how important this is in case he “gets run over by a bus!” The Lodge won’t be lost without the information needed to run the business side of the Lodge. Dan was recognized by the Grand Lodge of Colorado as the Secretary of the Year in 2019.

Brother Dan and Janet moved a total of 13 times in his nearly 22 year Marine career. Except for two-year assignment to the USS Nassau (LHA-4), he served on “shore duty.” Janet had been to Colorado as a child on vacation with her parents and they decided to move here primarily because of the great opportunities for outdoor recreation. They live near Conifer and Janet is a mental health therapist with her own practice. Their three children are: twins Justin—serving in the U.S. Navy in Maryland, and Trishana, living in Montrose with her husband and three kids; and son Tyler, who lives in Denver.

Dan did not have any Masonic connections in his immediate family. When he left the military, he was looking for something similar—a brotherhood, a fraternity, good men that he could associate with. His daughter Trishana was perusing the internet, looking for possible scholarships. She told Dan that he should look at the website for the Grand Lodge of Colorado—this looked to her like what he was looking for—charity, faith, leadership. WB Burney Brandel called Dan in response to Dan’s email and the rest, as they say, is history. Dan began

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meeting for lunch with Brothers Burney and Wayne Arner, then Brother Steve Munsinger joined them. Dan's first line signer was WB Burney and WB Wayne signed on the second line when Dan joined South Denver #93 in 2003. Dan served as Worshipful Master of South Denver #93 in 2010.

When I asked Dan who the most influential Masons in his life are, he immediately mentioned Brothers Burney and Wayne, as both fellow Marines and as Masons. Wayne was Dan's mentor in Blue Lodge. He also mentioned WB's Floyd Simmons and Ikey Starks, both Past Masters of South Denver #93. These two Brothers were always anxious to sit with Dan, to counsel him and to help in any way they could. He mentioned how great their positive attitudes were for him. He also mentioned WB Phil Coomber—a brilliant ritualist that could give all the lectures and perform the degrees in such a meaningful and thoughtful manner.

Dan's words of wisdom to his Brothers:

- Concentrate on your Blue Lodge—don't get spread too thin too quickly.
- Be open and honest—communication is absolutely critical.
- Take your time. Be patient.

Thank you so much to Brother Dan Rivers for sharing so much time and energy with me in preparing this Member Spotlight. And, I hope that each of you, as you read this, will take brother Dan's words to heart and that you will make a special effort to reach out to him at your next opportunity. What an interesting man with many, many interesting ideas. Be well Brothers, and stay safe. Hope to see you all soon!

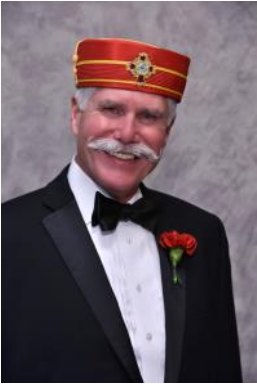
