

Front Door Security System

A security system has been installed on the sliding door entrance to the building. The door is no longer left unlocked during business hours allowing anyone to enter the building unannounced and take the elevator to the third floor offices. EMERGENCE



Strange word that ... "emergence." The variant "emergency" isn't really applicable here, so we'll skip that part of the etymology. "Emergence" is the appearance of a new property in the course of the evolution something. So, let's think about this for a minute: when COVID first became a serious concern, and we were forced to sequester ourselves from each other, restrict public appearances, and maintain distances (I won't call that "social" at all, because it's not) from others ... we all had to make a lot of adjustments—call this a new EMERGING behavior on our part ... we made them in our personal, work, and social lives. I'm pretty sure many of us thought this wouldn't be a long-term thing (surprise!) and we'd be back to something "normal" within a few weeks or a couple of months at the outside. But, as we watched the infection rates, hospitalization rates, deaths, and longer term statistics—reality began so sink in. We CHANGED our behaviors. Wore masks (most of us anyway), ventured out only on essential tasks (grocery shopping, medical issues, etc.), and limited our interactions even with family members. For all intents and purposes, we forced ourselves to become somewhat of a "hermit" society. All you had to do was look at traffic (what traffic?) on US 36 or I-25 during the week when in normal times it would be congested and stop-and-go. Then it was pretty much "smooth sailing" even during what we used to call "rush hour."

A little over a year later, we're starting to see various states, counties, and local communities gradually lift restrictions on public gatherings and the activities that we used to take for granted. We're still seeing inconsistencies across the country in this regard, but the general trend is to begin opening back up a bit. Of course, the standard disclaimer is that we're also watching the various statistics and looking to see if we see additional infections that might indicate we've opened up too soon, but as more and more people become vaccinated and herd immunity develops (yes, we are NOT there quite yet), things will begin to return to some sort of "normal" for us.

The question is, what is "normal" after a year of isolation, restrictions, and a realignment of our old habits? When the restrictions are lifted and we're able to meet in-person again, how many of us who found that "virtual" participation in a lot of our activities (and work too) was actually preferable to the old "grind" and habits we had developed over many years? Many companies have decided not to return to full in-person working, as it means they can reduce their need for office space - along with the cost savings of not having to maintain a large infra-

structure that had been developed to keep the business operating. Business seemed to work just fine with many people working from home—or at least a significant portion of the time. Oh, certain jobs just CAN'T work from home, but MANY can—and can do so quite effectively and efficiently without having to force people to commute daily and they still get their work done.

So, when we come back out, now that the Consistory has figured out just how beneficial ZOOM sessions are at getting some of our "missing in action" brethren back into our midst, we will continue to live-stream our meetings (with certain caveats, obviously). So, will people that WERE regular attenders in person now find that virtual attendance is much more convenient for them personally and decide to participate that way? What will that mean for the essential folks that have to be at the facility in person to make all this happen?

I've personally attended Consistory meetings in a couple of other Valleys. In one, there were 12 (yes, TWELVE) people present, including me. The comment was that meetings were boring, but special events (family oriented) would draw 200-300 in attendance. I've been to a few Craft Lodge (yeah, you all call them "Blue" Lodges) and other group meetings with too few to conduct routine business, and this was all before COVID. Now I'm wondering how our "emergence" from the restrictions is going to impact our in-person attendance, which conservatively speaking, was not all that encouraging to begin with in general.

I, for one, am all in favor of continuing to use ZOOM wherever appropriate and possible. It's probably the only outreach program that works to get back in touch with members who have moved away, who can't drive at night (or at all) any more, or who simply don't want to drive in the miserable rush hours in Denver. I'll still be there in-person when I can, but now I know I have the option to participate from home if I'm sick (I'm sure you'd rather I not come and "share" whatever I might have in person) or can't wind up my personal business in time to make it down for something I'll call "routine."

Let's not use "emergence" as an excuse to stay home, but let's not abandon the technology that allowed us to participate and get back in touch with our "MIA" Brothers for the past year.

FYI, the Spanish Flu pandemic of the early 1900's lasted probably TWO YEARS. It infected 500 million worldwide—about 1/3 of the entire world's population at the time. It killed 20-50 million in the world, including 675,000 Americans. Average life expectancy dropped by 12 years during that pandemic. More U.S. soldiers died of the Spanish Flu than in WWI. And, it only ended when enough people either died or developed immunity—because there was NO such thing as a flu shot or vaccine to combat it. Medicine and science have come a long way.

So, be smart about your "emergence" from this pandemic. Whether you believe it was real or not is immaterial; many people have died, many more have developed serious after-effects, and the landscape of the pandemic is constantly changing—as we always said in the military—"a moving target is harder to hit." Don't be surprised if things suddenly take a nasty turn before we're done.

Looking forward to seeing you when you feel comfortable with "emerging" and being a part of the Consistory and Masonic communities again.

Just what is "Masonic Education"?

I...NEED...YOUR...INPUT!

We hear a lot about it...

Research indicates that we enjoy stated meetings more when it's included...

The MW Grand Master expects it at every Blue Lodge meeting, and our P.R. and Deputy both value it highly...

But what is it exactly: this creature we call "Masonic Education?"

Is it, metaphorically, like art ("I don't know Masonic Education, but I know what I like")? To some extent, that's probably true for all of us. Some of the best educational experiences I've personally had in Lodge occurred when I had no idea what was coming as the program started!

Is it ritual and floorwork instruction? It certainly can be (and very rewarding too), especially when there's opportunity for Q & A with the presenter.

Is it a presentation on the symbolism and lessons of a degree? This is both a valuable and an obvious option, especially with our intellectually challenging Scottish Rite work ... and there's so much good material! We came to especially appreciate this possibility with the comments from members who participated, along with our reunion class, in *Journey to the Scottish Rite*.

Should we focus upon history? ...biographies of notable Brethren? ...esoteric teachings? ... community involvement? ...charity? ...Masonic books? All of these, and more, are worthy possibilities.

So, what's a Director of Education to do?!? That is precisely my question and why I say...

I...NEED...YOUR...INPUT!

My professional training is in Curriculum Development, so I'm pretty much fine with the design and the implementation part. However, in the educational world, the "what" is usually a matter of mandate by higher authority: there's not much development of elective curriculum anymore ... more's the pity!

But, in my case, that "higher authority" should be, for the most part, YOU!

So, I've been tasked with developing an educational program for Denver Consistory, and, for me, there are three guiding principles:

Incorporate as much of what is already available, by way of educational resources, into our overall program;

Move beyond "presentations at stated meetings" as the be-all-and-end-all of our program; and ...

Finally, that "higher authority" part: Develop educational offerings along lines which resonate with members' interests, needs and especially their willingness to participate.

In my March article, here in *Rite Works*, I outlined several sources for Masonic information, interaction and (if accessed for that purpose) education. Maybe, since then, you've had a chance to check out some of those sources, click a few links or explore various possibilities. If not, the old issues are archived here, and you can still do that, so we're all on the same page.

Many of the sources from that article (a very small sample, I might add), made up of podcasts, books, blogs, research lodges, and the rest, are opportunities for important educational experiences. But we need to find a way to combine those and other resources—along with by far our greatest educational asset: each other—to build a complete program.

Themes on our annual calendar are a "given" for some sort of an educational program, as are the presentations and discussions on degrees at stated meetings. Those are enjoyable for me to produce and present, have generally been received well, and will be a lot more rewarding as we're back in face-to-face meetings: Zoom "discussions" having some limitations in a large virtual group.

But these presentations (even under the best of conditions) have limited appeal and aren't really focused on the interests and talents that **YOU** bring to the table. So, did I mention...?

I ... NEED ... YOUR ... INPUT!

Some of you may be familiar with a book entitled *The Craft Driven Lodge* (Macoy, 2017, ISBN 978-0-88083-108-5). It was written by Bro. & Dr. Daniel D. Hrinko. Brother Dan is a professional psychologist, Past Master and Past District Deputy Grand Master (equivalent, more or less, to our District Lecturer) in Ohio's 9th Masonic District. Bro. Dan also happens to be a former student of mine, from waaaaaaay back toward the beginning of my career. Small world!

His book undertakes the study of what makes a Lodge successful, with involved and engaged Brethren, exemplary ritual work and productive meetings and programs. His most basic premise centers on four core principles:

Every Mason has a Voice,

Every Mason has a Vision,

Every Mason has a Role, and

Lodge Leadership needs to be "servant leadership."

An educational program for Denver Consistory based on such principles—responsive to what **members** need & want enough to actually participate—will move us ahead. Anything less will probably fall short.

Obviously, this is where you all come in **and in an absolutely indispensable way!** The simple fact is that what I might plan, implement and enjoy participating in myself could well fall flat from your perspective. I need to know what will work for you! We can go from there to find both resources and the right people to make worthwhile programs happen.

Brethren, I'm not really soliciting just "good ideas."

Likewise, I'm not really asking what you believe may work for anyone else or what other Brethren would like or support.

What I want to know is "What might **you** be interested in actually participating in, in terms of Masonic education?"

Finally, "What subjects, topics or themes might actually find their way into educational programs?"

Brethren, if we take the lessons of the Fellowcraft Degree at face value, **any** study which improves the mind and provides further light in Masonry—**whatever illuminates your own journey and commitment to Truth**—is absolutely "on the table" as Masonic education. The Seven Liberal Arts & Sciences are symbolic of the universal scope of Freemasonry's attitude toward maximizing the potential of every Brother. So, if for you that's quantum physics, then that's Masonic education. If you desire to know more about World Religions or Mexican History or need a practical study of how to learn ritual, then that's Masonic education!

We often refer to the Scottish Rite as "The University of Freemasonry." The universe is a big place, with lots of room for diverse interests and study!

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



Ill. Bro. Robert W. (Bob) Gregory, 33°

This month's Member Spotlight focuses on Illustrious Brother Bob Gregory. It's been a privilege for me to know Illustrious Brother Bob for a few years and to be able to spend several hours on the phone with him preparing this month's Member Spotlight column. Brother Bob has been involved in virtually every possible Masonic organization for more than fifty years, and it's doubtful that you haven't also met him somewhere and at sometime in your Masonic travels.

Bob was born and grew up in Greeley, Colorado, where his parents owned a men's clothing store - Gregory's for Men. Bob's dad and grandfather, a tailor, had opened the business after his father returned from World War II. Bob graduated from Greeley High School, then attended the University of Colorado-Boulder studying pre-med. After one year, he transferred to Colorado State University in Fort Collins and switched his major to business. He graduated from CSU in 1970.

During his first two years of college, Bob was in the ROTC program and was planning on being commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the Air Force upon graduation. However, a rare eye problem disqualified him, and he had to leave the ROTC program. In 1970, when he graduated, things were a bit more complicated. The draft lottery had been implemented and Bob's number was #17. He went to the local Air Force recruiter and applied for, and was accepted into, Officer Training School (OTS). He started pilot training after leaving Lackland AFB in San Antonio, Texas, and soon his eye problem was re-diagnosed which grounded him. He then became a missile launch officer and attended missile school in Omaha at the headquarters of the Strategic Air Command (SAC). He served the next year at a missile silo near Tucson, Arizona and then with the wind-down of the Vietnam War, he became eligible for, and accepted, an "early out." He returned to Greeley in April of 1972 and began working in the family store.

In 1986 the family made the difficult decision to close the store. The market had shifted, and a "fine clothing" business just couldn't compete with the lower-priced, off-the-rack chain stores any more. At that time, Bob decided to turn his hobby into his profession, and he became an investment and financial consultant with E. F. Hutton. After about four years, E. F. Hutton was merged with Shearson/Lehman Brothers and closed the office in Greeley. Bob moved his practice to A. G. Edwards in Fort Collins. Five years later, A. G. Edwards merged into Wells Fargo Bank and Bob then joined Charles Schwab and remained with Schwab until his retirement in 2001.

Brother Bob has never married, but is the proud "parent" of three "children in fur coats" - two dogs and a cat - ALL rescue animals. As he described it, and those of us with pets know,

he is their "staff person."

Illustrious Brother Bob began his Masonic journey when he joined the Greeley Chapter of DeMolay. He had been in the Boy Scouts but was looking for something a little more meaningful, and after talking with his dad about DeMolay, he petitioned the chapter. Bob served as Master Councilor of his chapter and was awarded the Representative DeMolay award, the Chevalier Degree, and later the DeMolay Legion of Honor. Bob has one sibling, a younger sister who was in the local Rainbow Girls Assembly.

Bob was Initiated, Passed, and Raised in Occidental Lodge #20 in Greeley, Colorado in February, April, and May of 1970 respectively. He later served as Worshipful Master of Occidental in 1982 and then was Director of the Work from 1983-1985. When he served in the East at the age of 33, Worshipful Brother Bob had the honor of being the second youngest Master in the 145 year history of the Lodge. Occidental #20 later merged with Garfield #50 in Longmont. Bob served as a District Lecturer from 1985 to 2016 and served on a number of Grand Lodge committees in that time frame and continues to serve on them today. Bob's father and both grandfathers were also Scottish Rite Masons, although neither of them was especially active and had not gone through the chairs. The night of Bob's Master Mason proficiency was especially meaningful to Bob, as his grandfather received his 50-year jewel that same night.

Shortly after becoming proficient as a Master Mason, Bob wanted to join the Scottish Rite. At that time, a man had to have been a proficient Master Mason for at least one year before he could petition to join the Consistory. Bob was about to join the U. S. Air Force, and his father asked for a waiver so that Bob could join the Scottish Rite in Denver, but the waiver was denied. Bob later joined a Consistory in California while in the air Force and then demitted to the Denver Consistory when he left the Air Force and came back to Greeley. He also had joined the Shrine in California, but later demitted to El Jebel Shrine.

As a member of the Shrine's Antique Auto Patrol, Bob needed an antique car to drive. He had always been a "car guy" and his first car was a 1928 Model A Ford that had been owned by his mother's aunt. The car had been bought new by his aunt and uncle after the uncle's passing, his aunt continued to drive the Model A as her daily driver. When she became too old to drive safely, the car sat in the garage and began to slowly deteriorate. When Bob was 15, his great-aunt gave Bob the car and he began to restore it and drive it. He finally sold the Model A about six years ago. But ... he really needed something with more pizzazz for the Shrine Patrol. He bought a 1929 Chrysler Coupe and drove it for several years before trading it and getting a 1930 Auburn Cabriolet. This is an EXTREMELY rare car—only 361 of them were built—and Bob had a total restoration done professionally.

His next car in his "collection" is a 1934 Packard which was his retirement gift to himself. This is another extremely rare car as only 280 of them were built. He rounded out his extremely rare and impressive collection when he attended a Ford Thunderbird convention in Breckenridge in the 1990's. A unique 1957 T-Bird with twin 4-barrel carburetors caught his eye. Again, only 1400 of these cars were ever built. He asked the lady standing beside the car if she was interested in selling it and she said she would have to ask her husband. Bob was persuasive and has now owned the T-Bird for more than 20 years. He is able to fit the three

classics and the "daily driver" in his 3-car garage and he does most of the mechanical work on the cars himself. I'm anxious to see his collection. Bob belongs to a number of national and local vintage and classic car clubs.

After his demit to the Denver Consistory in 1974, Illustrious Brother Bob became very active. He served as the Venerable Master of the Centennial Lodge of Perfection in 1995. He managed the Consistory's investments from 1994-2000. He was the Assistant Director and then later Director of the 31st Degree and the 19th Degree. He was invested a 32° KCCH in 1995 and was later coroneted a 33° in 2007. He serves on the Executive Committee of the Consistory as well as several foundation Boards and committees.

In the York Rite, Companion and Sir Knight Bob has served as High Priest in two chapters, as Thrice Illustrious Master of Larimer County Council and as Commander of the DeMolay Commandery. He is a Companion of the York Rite College, Ish Sodi, St. Thomas of Acon, and a Sir Knight of St. Bernard Commandery. He served as Grand Secretary and Recorder of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons and the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons from 2014-2018. He is a member of several Councils of the Allied Masonic Degrees. He has held leadership positions and offices in all the many Masonic organizations of which he is a member.

In the Shrine, Bob was active with the Antique Auto Patrol, has served as the blood donor Chairman of the Greeley Shrine Club and President, Secretary, and Membership Chairman of the Larimer County Shrine Club. Truly a great Mason and a busy Mason!

As always, I asked Brother Bob to share with us the names of the men that had been most influential in his Masonic travels. He named the following:

- His father a 32° Scottish Rite Mason. Although he was not active in his Blue Lodge or Consistory, he "lived the creed of a Mason every day."
- MWPGM Irving Cannon the Chapter Dad of Bob's DeMolay Chapter.
- MWPGM Clarence Carlson the WM of Fidelity #192 and the man that coached Brother Bob on his proficiencies as he was being initiated, passed, and raised. Brother Clarence ran the heating plant at CSU and he and Bob would meet in the boiler room to practice his proficiencies.
- WB Bill Ferkin an old family friend, a plumber, and WM of Occidental #20 in 1939. Also, WB Bill was the 3rd Ruffian in his 3rd Degree. He always encouraged Brother Bob to continue his Masonic career and education. WB Ferkin left his gavel to Bob when he passed, and Bob used it during his year in the East.

Illustrious Brother Bob's words of wisdom to all Masons:

- Get active in the organization. You can't know and appreciate the benefits of the fraternity unless you're active within it.
- Meet the members. All of them. Just go up and introduce yourself and get to know the Brothers.
- Live by the tenets and teachings of Freemasonry. This is especially important in today's world. We can all work to be better men.

TRAP LEAGUES At COLORADO CLAYS

League shooting is a great way to get together and spend an evening at the shooting range with friends, co-workers, and acquaintances. Trap leagues are also an excellent opportunity to further refine and hone your shooting skills, participate in some informal competition, and joust with fellow shooters in a friendly rivalry. And the camaraderie—what a great way to unwind after a tough day at the office or on the job. Colorado clays currently runs two trap leagues during the course of the year.

LEAGUE DETAILS

Trap league teams consist of 5 shooters. Each team is pre-assigned a time slot (beginning at 4:30 p.m. and ending at 7:30 p.m.) to shoot every **Wednesday** for **12 weeks.** Team members each shoot 50 targets (2 rounds) each week. The first round is shot from the 16 yard line and the second round yardage is determined by the team's handicap, minimum 20 yard line. The Registration Fee is \$50 per team and \$18 per shooter each week. Each team is allowed 2 substitutes and there must be 3 shooters present in order for scores to count. Returning teams are guaranteed their previous time slot. New teams will be asked to provide their first and second time slot choices.


