Front Door Security System

A security system has been installed on the sliding door entrance to the building. WHAT? ME VOLUNTEER?



Many of you might remember a TV show called "Dobie Gillis" where resident Hippy Maynard G. Krebs used to holler "WORK" in a rather unique voice. Well, I can visualize people saying the word "volunteer" in much the same way. In fact, I know "NAVY" stands for "Never Again Volunteer Yourself." Not sure I can make an acronym breakout that salient for "Masonry" though.

But, here's a dose of reality for everyone. Pretty much all of Masonry is a VOLUNTEER organization. We have VERY FEW salaried employees. There is no way for this organization – and thus our leaders (Grand Line Officers, Lodge officers) – to function without the help of MANY volunteers working in the background together.

Take a look at our current cadre of "volunteers" around the organization — and it pretty much doesn't matter whether you're talking about a Lodge, Chapter, Council, Assembly, Bethel, or any other organization — Masonic or otherwise. Most have been doing their thing for many years now. While it's not that they are necessarily tired or burned out, most of them are looking for someone to step up to the plate and begin the turnover process so they can relax a bit and still be in a position to help out when, not if, their replacement runs into a snag.

Now, this applies to EVERYTHING we do in our organizations. From day-to-day operations to the special events that we put on now and then. ALL of our volunteers provide important and essential functions for the group. We are cautioned to make sure that our subordinate officers are prepared to "step up" to the next level in case of emergency or unplanned vacancy. Yet, how do you effectively do that if you can't get anyone to step in and learn the ins and outs of these support jobs? I mean, we pretty much know that our elected lines expect to do these things, but it's all the support folks around them that also need to be relieved now and then. Think about it, if you have 2 or 3 PAST whatevers in these support jobs, then you have a place to fall back in an emergency. Otherwise, WHEN, not if, something unexpected happens, you're forced to scramble around like a chicken with its head chopped off trying to cover the sudden absence.

I know ... I've been there myself ... you look at the incumbents in a given job and you think to yourself "They've been doing this for a long time and really know that job well. There's no way I could do the job like they do." Well, at one time, they too didn't know about the job –

just like on active duty in the military, you showed up, spent a couple of weeks (months?) learning the ins-and-outs of the job, and the rest is history because you just picked up and started doing the job with a lot of people around you that supported you when you needed it. What we usually find is that the hardest part is learning the job, and once you do the upfront work, after that it becomes pretty routine for the most part.

The more people we have pulling together, the lower the individual effort that will be required by any other one person to make sure the organization functions well.

Besides, sometimes these people might want to take on a different job in the organization for a while, maybe another job that is in dire need of help, but they can't as long as they have the responsibility for their current job. If you pick up and take over that job, then they can move into that other essential job that is currently not being done.

So, if you think you want to step up to the plate and actually "volunteer" for any of the positions, OR you have a pet special project you think would help the Consistory be more useful and relevant to the former, current, and future members, let Matt know and he'll put you in touch with someone that will help get you started. It's not a lifetime arrangement — but we DO need help to sustain our operations — there's just no way around that fact of life. Remember, it's not WHAT job you take on, but rather that you are willing to take on A job to help out.

AS IMPORTANTLY: if you volunteer to do a job, make sure you actually show up and do it. That means you need to carefully de-conflict your calendar and make SURE that you can actually do what you say you will do.

PETITIONS FOR FALL REUNION—NEVER TOO EARLY TO GET THEM IN !!!

EDITOR'S NOTE: Brothers, this is not your typical "rah-rah" get the petitions in sort of exhortation from me. Take a hard look at the numbers above. It CLEARLY shows an unmistakable trend DOWNWARD at what is apparently around the normal 5+% loss per year in most organizations, including Masonry. WHAT IS THE NUMBER OF MEMBERS that we MUST have in order to carry out our BASIC missions? You have to determine that, not me. As numbers go down, so too goes a concomitant reduction in our ability to put on programs and do things the way we have become accustomed to doing them. This is a simple, but hard and cold fact. Either you start finding some new members to replace those who are dying, demitting, and going NPD, or we have to face reality and realize that we WILL go out of business at some point. Just where that point is up for grabs - again, YOU determine where it is by the number of new members you can bring in to replace those who are no longer active members.

BUT ... it's not JUST dues paying members we need. We need ACTIVE members who will PAR-TICIPATE in the Reunions, come to the meetings, take part in our special activities, and consider taking a spot in our officer lines and on our essential committees.

Teachable Moments

On Saturday, August 7, Denver Consistory will roll out the "beta" version of *Journey to the Scottish Rite (J2SR)*, reprising the very successful initial offering of the program last fall and winter. Brothers enrolled in *J2SR* will join their fellow candidates as members of the Fall Reunion Class on November 18-20. It is our hope that they will also find *J2SR* inspiring and encouraging, as they prepare to cross the threshold of Denver Consistory.

As current members of Denver Consistory, you are once again welcome to join in that *Journey*. Our text for the study is already on your bookshelf: Rex Hutchens' *A Bridge to Light*. The weekly reading assignments and the link to the weekly Zoom sessions are only an email or phone call away. So, if you didn't join us for the initial *Journey*...or even if you did...c'mon along!

Thinking about that effort to get our soon-to-be-new Masters of the Royal Secret off to the best possible start, my head turned to our responsibility, here in our University of Free-masonry, to a commitment—as both its faculty and student body—to learning.

Author: "In the morning, after hard work, I took a comma out of one sentence."

Interviewer: "And in the afternoon...?"

Author: "In the afternoon, I put it back again!"

(Variously attributed—and in various forms—to Mark Twain, Oscar Wilde (both

Freemasons), and Gustave Flaubert (who was not).

If you've seen and spent a little time with the most recent (2019) revision of the MWGL of Colorado's *Clear Text Key*, you'll appreciate many of the tweaks, adjustments & additions in this edition: inclusion of the Uniform Floor Work Booklet within the CTK, several clarifications and explanations for consistency, slide-change markers for the lectures (Yes!), inclusion of the Four Man Opening and Closing and much more.

One change, however, had me scratching my head sufficiently to ask RW Kevin Townley, Colorado's Grand Lecturer, if it might be a typo. In both the EA° Opening and in the EA° Candidate Lecturer (proficiency "catechism"), a comma has been inserted after the words "To learn" in answer to a certain important, early question. The effect (without changing the obligation of a Brother to do the other two things in the answer) is to turn what was a two-part into a three-part response: effectively emphasizing the EA's general responsibility "to learn." My initial response was not favorable (part of what prompted the question to RW Kevin), although I now admit that was no more than a case of <u>W.N.D.I.T.W.B.</u>*

Long story short? Not only is the change **not** a typo, but, when you look at it in the context of a focus upon learning throughout the Craft Degrees, the value of an educational effort in all of Freemasonry comes through loud and clear! From the EA charge's admonition to "... converse with well-informed Brethren...", through the capstone lesson of our 32°, we ought to undertake an effort to open minds, expand knowledge and engage inquiry at every opportunity.

What is becoming increasingly clear, should we **not** take advantage of these chances to teach and to learn, is that we will miss perhaps the single greatest opportunity we have to revitalize the Fraternity. Contrary to what some opponents of "reform" advise, Freemasonry needn't commit to "change" that is in the slightest antithetical to the landmarks and ancient usages of the Craft. What we cannot do, however, is continue to count on a reputation for fellowship and benevolence (both unquestionably tremendous attributes of our Fraternity) to be sufficient "draw" to repopulate our ranks, fill our coffers, save our often-aging buildings and generally reinvigorate the Craft.

As the serious candidate and progressing Brother takes upon himself the obligation to "improve himself," so must we all—who are both teachers and students in this University of ours—find the time to inquire, to reflect, to learn…and then to teach. And to anyone who doubts the need to consider what those who follow after us may think of our stewardship, consider the words of Brother Rudyard Kipling in <u>The Palace</u>.

* W.N.D.I.T.W.B. = "We never did it that way before!"

Finally, as promised...

July's Trivia Question: In what (non-U.S.) Masonic rite, or "system," is a man's eligibility for membership entirely predicated on his being a professing Christian believer?

Answer: Depending upon how one interprets the question, there may be multiple, arguable answers, but what I had in mind was **The Swedish Rite**, a branch of the Craft found in the Scandinavian countries and in Germany (one of the five Grand Lodges in Deutschland). It has a much different structure than U.S. and other Anglo-based systems: three "bodies" and a total of eleven (11) degrees...with the 11th reserved for Grand Lodge officers only.

The Swedish Rite is a highly selective Masonic system, with as many as 2-in-3 petitioners being rejected for initiation! Profession of a specific Christian faith can cause points of friction with other Masonic jurisdictions: both because of the Craft's generally non-sectarian focus AND because there are so many European GLs which require no recognition of Deity at all. Basically, Brethren of the Swedish Rite can find themselves assailed from both sides! Swedish Rite GLs are generally in amity with U.G.L.E. and U.S. Grand Lodges. For a bit more info, look here.

This Month's Trivia Question: Both Albert Pike and Dr. Mackey credit one person with the establishment of Scottish Rite bodies in America. Who has that honor and distinction?



I decided to talk about something I know a little bit about and how it may relate or help our Lodges. I work in marketing as a Creative Technologist. Basically, it's my job to make things on the internet look appealing. To make you want to click. To make you want to buy.



In November of 1992, CERN launched this first website (http://info.cern.ch/hypertext/www/TheProject.html) on the World Wide Web. The internet, and websites, have come a long way since in terms of content and design.

Does your Lodge have a website? Is it updated? How often? And with what content? Is it responsive? I don't mean the "ourlodgepage.com" pages that the Grand Lodge provides. I mean its own personal website that your Lodge maintains. The GL directory is a good tool to have but it only states your address, phone number and dates you meet. It doesn't tell a story. We all know every Lodge has its own soul, and that's what we want to show.

I did a quick search of a handful of local Denver Lodge websites. I found some that weren't responsive, some URLs that didn't work, some that looked outdated, and some that hadn't been updated in two years.

Among other factors, updating your website increases your search rankings. I did a Google search for the keywords "Denver Freemasonry". The Denver Consistory was number 1. Denver Lodge No.5 was the second. Then you have a bunch of random news articles about conspiracies and the Denver Airport. The next Lodges don't show up until the second page of results. We can do better than that.

It's not just Freemasonry. Many organizations see a website simply as a box to check, like getting business cards. But your website should clearly explain your goals to potential

prospects and members, have information about upcoming events, help generate followers on your social media accounts, and most importantly, if it tells a story that touches your visitors, it becomes a powerful recruiting tool, 24hrs a day for as little as 5 bucks per month.

Is your website mobile responsive? Does it look good on a phone? Do you have to pinch and zoom to read text? Is it cumbersome to navigate?

A recent survey found that millennials have little patience for sites that are not mobile-friendly, missing information, and the inability to find the information they want quickly and easily. This means your key demographic is walking away before they even know where to knock.

Does your Lodge have a Facebook page? What about Instagram? I found very few Lodges had Instagram accounts. Facebook is great and boomers are the fastest growing demographic on Facebook. But the majority of Instagram users are under 30, that key demographic we want to grow. Instagram is free and easy to set up. It's even owned by Facebook so you can link the two accounts for your Lodge and post once in Instagram and its automatically posted on your Facebook page.

Freemasonry has long competed with technology for people's time. Television, then the internet and social media lure men to stay home rather than go out and socialize.

Ironically, the things that we are competing against, we need to use to lure them back. Gone are the days of Masonic events posted in the newspaper or at the local post office. For better or worse, this is how society communicates. Our online presence is more important now than ever.


And now, coming out of quarantine, is the perfect time for us. These men have been locked indoors. They've had over a year of binge-watching Netflix, YouTube videos, political arguments on Facebook and now they are coming out. Out of the dark looking for more. More interactions. Connections. Fraternity. People are seeking more experiences. Last month restaurant sales surpassed grocery sales for the first time in one year.

So, we understand that the internet is the medium to communicate, but what's the message?

Apple 1984 commercial. (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=VtvjbmoDx-l)

Apple released this commercial, directed by Ridley Scott, in January of 1984. Notice there isn't a single product image, or even an explanation of what the product is, but you get a visceral feeling. You're excited to know what's coming. You want to join.

The Golden Circle



Simon Sinek is an internationally known speaker on business and leadership topics. He noticed that when average organizations communicate who they are, they start with what they do or make (i.e. the products and services they provide). Then, how they do it and what sets them apart from their competitors. But almost no one knows WHY they do it. It's not the money/profits ... that's a result. But what's the purpose or the reason the organization exists? He found a connection between some of the world's most forward-thinking organizations, Apple among them. They always start with the "WHY?"

If Apple did it like everyone else, their message would be:

We make great computers.

We make our products beautifully designed, simple to use, and user friendly.

Want to buy one? Probably not.

In Freemasonry, we make our members wiser and better.

We accomplish this by a means of a series of moral instructions, taught by types, symbols and allegorical figures.

Want to join? Meh.

Instead, Apple says:

In everything we do, we believe in challenging the status quo.

We believe in thinking differently.

We make our products beautifully designed, simple to use, and user friendly.

We make great computers.

Want to buy one?

That sounds different. That feels different. Loyalty is a feeling.

So, what's our "Why"? I asked some Brothers and a lot say charity, but I'd argue against that. Years ago, when our Deputy of the Supreme Council in Colorado, Karl Hinkle, was Grand Master of Masons in Colorado, I heard him give a talk. Something he said struck me and stuck with me ever since. I'll paraphrase here. The charity, scholarship money, volunteering. That's not who we are. That's not what we're about. Those are by-products of the men we are creating in the Lodge.

A by-product of the "Why." So then what is our "Why"? That's what we need to find and that is what we need to lead with as our single most important message to people.



Watching it makes you want to join, to be a part of, to be more than just a Man. I spoke with them and they said that anyone is free to use it on their websites and social media as long as its used to promote Masonry. I encourage you to do so.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT Brother Bart Corfee, 32°KCCH

Soon after you read this Member Spotlight, it will be out of date. Brother Bart has been elected to receive the 33° Honorary of the Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite and will be coroneted in late September of this year. In other words, Brother Bart will be a "white hat". Congratulations on an honor well-deserved, Brother Bart! Bart was in the Fall Reunion Class in 2010 and is a Past Master of Idaho Springs #26. He was raised a Master Mason in Central #6 in 2009 and is a dear friend. It is an honor for me to write the Member Spotlight focusing this month on Brother Bart Corfee.

Bart was born in Sacramento, California and grew up in nearby Davis, California. His dad was a Mason, although he never really discussed Masonry with Bart. Both his paternal and maternal grandparents lived in Sacramento and Bart spent a lot of time with both sets of grandparents and was very close to them. As we sat and talked for a couple of hours in Bart's office overlooking Evergreen Lake, he kept referring back to his grandparents and the tremendous influence they had on him as a young man. His grandfather Fred Corfee taught Bart the game of golf. By the way, Bart is about a 5 handicap today but was a +1-handicap golfer in college. For those of you that understand golf, you'll know what that means. For the readers that don't understand or know golf handicaps, think of Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, Lee Trevino, Fred Couples and others. At the pinnacle of their respective games, they were probably between a +2 and a +4 handicap. Bart could easily have been a professional golfer. While working on his BS degree at Sacramento State College, Bart worked as a teaching professional at one of the local golf courses in Sacramento. He is in the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce Sports Hall of Fame as a collegiate golfer.

Grandpa Fred Corfee started a small laundry and dry-cleaning business in Sacramento that grew considerably when Bart's dad Allen joined the company. They eventually expanded to have 26 dry cleaners/laundries in their business and more than 400 employees. Quite an entrepreneurial success story in the 1960's and '70's. Grandpa Fred was a Master Mason, a Scottish Rite Mason and a Shriner. Although he never openly discussed Masonry with Bart, he sprinkled subtle hints into nearly every serious conversation that he and Bart shared. For instance, he would say, "That man is on the level." Or "That's a square man." Unbeknownst to Bart at the time, Grandpa Fred was gently teaching Bart what it means to be a Mason.

Bart's father Allen was a Korean War veteran and after retiring from the family business, Allen and Barbara moved to the Veterans' Home in Yountville, California in the Napa Valley. Allen passed about five years ago but Barbara, now 90 years young, still lives in the Veterans' Home where she plays poker "with the guys" three or four nights a week. Like Grandfather Fred, Allen was a Mason, but again, never spoke openly with Bart about Masonry.

Bart's maternal grandparents were both educators, teaching at the high school and college level. Although not a Mason, Grandfather Bailey had an exceptionally strong level of commitment to his community and to those around him. He volunteered and taught inmates at Folsom Prison (think Johnny Cash and Merle Haggard) for a number of years. Grandmother Ruby Bailey was Finnish and a school teacher.

Brother Bart comes from a family of over-achievers. In addition to his highly successful entrepreneurial grandparents and parents, Bart has three siblings, all younger than him. Sister Jan has lived in Paris for more than 20 years and is a widow. She is a PhD engineer and has been the Director of Global Warming Studies for the OECD (the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development) for the past twenty years. She received her undergraduate degree at Berkeley, then went to MIT for her graduate studies. She has two children.

Sister Karen also received her undergraduate degree from Berkeley and her Master's degree from Stanford. Karen is a retired alternative energy company executive and lives in the same area as her three children in the San Francisco Bay area.

Brother Dan lives in Davis with his wife with their two children close by and Dan is the President & Founder of Preferred Capital Management, Sacramento.

If you haven't met Toni, Bart's beautiful and wonderful wife, you need to meet her and get to know her ASAP. You'll fall in love with Toni! She is absolutely delightful. Brother Bill Skewes really doesn't like Bart – he just likes to hang out with Bart and claims Bart as his best friend to allow him the opportunity to spend time with Toni! LOL! Toni is a Vice President with Ameritas, an insurance and financial planning company. She is originally from Long Beach, California. Her father and mother ran a very successful business in Long Beach and were able to retire at age 39 and move to Glenwood Springs, Colorado, where they started Rocky Mountain Sports – an outdoor adventure company that allowed them to share their passion for all outdoor activities with their customers and clients.

This is the second marriage for both Bart and Toni. They met and were married in California in 1987 and have two children – Katelyn, married to Jake who is with Denver Water. Katelyn is the mother of Bart & Toni's first grandson Charlie, now seven months old. Son Brendan is a recent graduate of San Diego State University and is a management recruiter for Amazon Web Services, living in the San Diego area.

When Toni's dad was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma in 1992, Bart and Toni made the decision to move from California in order to be closer to her parents. Bart had come out to Colorado to look for a place to live and was headed to Bailey, Colorado to look at properties. He stopped in Evergreen for lunch and then went on to Bailey. A couple of hours later, and not "feeling the love" for Bailey, he called Toni and told her to pack up, they were moving to Evergreen. This was in October 1992.

As you would expect, Bart soon joined the Evergreen Rotary Club, where within a few years he had helped to grow the membership from about 40 to more than 100 members and was chosen as "Rotarian of the Year". He also joined Evergreen Fire & Rescue, the local volunteer fire department and became a certified EMT. He joined the Evergreen Chamber of Commerce and was elected President of the Chamber. With all the community involvement, Bart was heavily engaged and busy, but Toni was asking, "this is really great to be a big part of the

community, but when do you think we'll start making a living?"

Bart had started his own asset management company, Corfee & Associates and had become a business partner with his mentor and friend Lew Katcher, the principal at BTR (Balanced Total Return) in San Francisco. Bart had originally started his career as a stockbroker in 1980 with Sutro & Company, an old and highly respected stock brokerage firm in San Francisco. The relationship with BTR continues today, and Bart has indeed "started to make a living." BTR has more than \$1 billion in assets that they manage. Corfee & Associates has \$50 million under management. Bart holds several professional licenses and certifications, including ChFC. Bart is bringing on a new young partner in March 2022. They have been working together for about a year and Bart's portfolio and opportunities for his clients will increase greatly.

Brother Bart has several outside, leisure time activities. He is an avid fly fisherman and regularly fishes in Colorado and Montana. He and Toni are sailors and scuba divers. He sailed and raced boats for thirteen years in San Francisco and they have made more than a dozen trips to the British Virgin Islands with clients and friends, generally for about 2-3 weeks and up to a dozen guests (three families) and Bart "captains" the boat – usually a 50' catamaran.

When we talked about the most influential men in his Masonic life, Bart immediately mentioned his grandfather Fred Corfee, Sr. – the one who spoke of a man being square, or on the level. Grandpa Fred was a strong believer in freedom of religion and was always a kind and generous man with never a bad word about anyone. Although he never graduated high school, he was the epitome of a Mason. Bart also spoke highly of his father Allen who embodied those same traits as a man and as a businessman.

As those of you who know Bart might expect, he also mentioned III. Brother Bill Skewes. In 2009, Bart and Toni were at Bill and Ann Skewes' home for dinner and Bart and Bill were sitting on the patio. Bill remarked that although Bart was very involved in the community, he could never be a Mason "because the Priest wouldn't let him". Bart had converted to Catholicism many years earlier. Bart's reply was, "I can handle my Priest relationship, I would like to be a Mason'. That began Bart's Masonic journey.

Bart named his Masonic "Pied Pipers" and defines them as "a charismatic person that attracts followers". I am honored that Bart considers me as one of his Masonic Pied Pipers in his Masonic work, starting and continuing under the leadership of III. Brother Bill Skewes and further evolving under the leadership of Danny Tomlinson, 32° KCCH (Note: Again, Bart insisted on including me). I'm humbled by his confidence in me.

Bart is a Past Master of Idaho Springs #26 and is a Plural Member of Central #6 (Junior Deacon) and Georgetown #12. He was raised a Master Mason at Central #6 in 2009 and joined the Scottish Rite in 2010. He has been a part of the 21st Degree team and will also be part of the 30th Degree team in the Fall 2021 Reunion. Bart is a Noble of El Jebel Shrine, altough not very active. At the Consistory, he serves on the Finance Committee, is the Vice President of the Scottish Rite Masonic Center Board and is the Master of Ceremonies in the Centennial Lodge of Perfection. He also is chairing our Scottish Rite Golf Classic to be held on August 20 at Willis Case Golf Course. It's not too late to sponsor and to sign up to play!

As you might imagine, Brother Bart's advice to all men and especially to his Masonic Brothers is to "get involved, but don't forget to enjoy the journey!"

Once more, it was such a pleasure and an honor to spend the afternoon with Brother Bart and to share stories of his life, that I might be able to then share them with you. Make it a personal goal for yourself to get to know Bart but be careful on golf bets with him!


