

Ineffable = unpronounceable? Maybe not.

I stumbled onto this anonymously written piece in a message from a dear friend. Given that we have JUST finished our Fall Reunion wherein we do indeed discuss the “ineffable name” of God more than once, I thought it particularly apropos, especially at this time of year.

Prepared in the Quarry



This month's housekeeping...

A couple of months ago, I described the changes not just coming, but already underway to revamp the Supreme Council's Master Craftsman[®] program. Changes in format and presentation have morphed the classes into the Master Craftsman Online College & Leadership Academy[®]. You might remember that the first new course added to the curriculum is *Why 33?*

You may also recall the prediction of more changes and new course offerings coming soon, as the revised approach to online learning in our *University of Freemasonry* takes shape. Well...it's happening, and (especially for those still thinking about taking the leap to enroll and begin serious studies) there appears to be an offer just too good to pass up! (11118943)

Introducing yet another new course: *The Master's Steps ...* and, oh yeah, how does **FREE** sound to you as a tuition charge?!? That's right, this new, single-session, online course is yours simply for taking the time to enroll! *The Master's Steps* is a refresher for experienced Masons or an introductory overview for newer Brothers (depending on your perspective), and, like *Why 33?* (which is still only \$5 to enroll, BTW), it's a course designed to also orient you to the new Academy approach.

Want to look at the details and, perhaps, start your studies? Simple! First, I suggest you read the excellent article by Maynard Edwards, 32°, KCCH (***A Flood of Light: The Birth of the Master Craftsman Online College***), in the December issue of our *Journal*. Then head [here](#), to the Supreme Council's website, select "Member Log-in" on the menu bar and either log-in or register to create a new account (easy, if you haven't done so already). Then select "Master Craftsman" on the Members' Dashboard, and you're on your way! Don't forget that it's also possible to convert courses you've already begun to the new system, which will allow you to take advantage of all the upgrades available in revised courses.

Drop me a note, if you run into any problems or have questions about getting started.

Quarryman or Master Builder? Both, of course, are stonemasons ... both skilled in the Craft ... both have served their time as Entered Apprentices ... and both have shown “suitable proficiency” to work on the project underway. I imagine that much of a quarryman’s work must have been especially difficult, physical labor: likely often repetitious and, though well paid, certainly out of the spotlight.

Early on in our speculative journey (in fact, in the first lecture we experienced as Entered Apprentices), we were reminded of a tradition—one passed on to the Craft from Scripture—regarding the tools used (and NOT used) “onsite” in the construction of King Solomon’s Temple. “No tool of iron ...” remember? What else were we told? Among much else, we were told that the stones prepared in the quarry were prepared to be “adjusted” at the worksite.

That’s an interesting word ...“adjusted,” and I believe it was chosen to convey a feeling of “finishing work” or “fine tuning,” as opposed to the heavy duty, fundamental labor done in the quarry.

There must have been a considerable amount of very skilled work done before stones appeared at the construction site. This had to have been the case, if what remained, where the building was being erected, was “adjustment” of stones all but completely prepared for the builders’ use. Those quarrymen must have been skilled Masons indeed—as skilled in the use of the very same tools as their fellows at the construction site—for them to send finished stones on their way, knowing that they would need only a final touch or two to fit exactly where required.

So it is with our moral preparation as living stones: the bulk of the work must be done in the quarry! For the finished stone (us) to be up to the task when needed, character—honesty, rectitude of conduct, a sense of plain dealing among equals—must already be established. Stones (again, us ... as we confront the defining events & decisions in our lives) cannot be rough-cut, finished, and polished all in a moment, as the pressures of those critical events & decisions loom. That, as certainly as in the erecting of a physical building, is a formula for disaster! If a man is not habitually honest, upright, and plain dealing (and thereby “prepared” for what lies ahead), his fall is likely in some moment of weakness. The serious work must be done “in the quarry,” already demonstrated in the more mundane events of daily living.

We may, understandably, crave the Master Architect’s spotlight, status, and recognition. But only if we are experienced, skilled, and practiced quarryman will our edifice be an enduring one and its future more than a matter of chance and happenstance.

Last Month’s Question: The Supreme Council did not assume control of the entire system of degrees, from 4th through 32nd, until after what significant event?

Answer: The Morgan Affair and the Anti-Masonic Movement.

In the earliest days of our Rite ... indeed even before the establishment of the Mother Supreme Council ... the Higher Degrees spread as “stand-alone” individual or clusters of degrees and bodies. A variety of Masonic or quasi-Masonic individuals and organizations were responsible for the development and popularization of this work, and the popularity of so many and so varied an assortment of degrees must have been frustrating for the new Supreme Council, in those early years. Headway toward making an orderly affair of the Rite was difficult: first due to the popularity of the various, older systems; second because many of their proponents were needed as supporters of the union achieved by the creation of the Rite headquartered in Charleston; and third because—in many areas of the country—a Rite of twenty-nine degrees stood to be a difficult institution to maintain and advance.

So (and this is a somewhat simplified description), there were Lodges of Perfection, Chapters of Rose Croix (or Princes of Jerusalem ... another part of the evolution of the structure we know today), Councils of Kadosh (or Rose Croix ... ditto that evolutionary story), and Conistories scattered about the landscape: effectively unaffiliated with one another, at least in the sense we would recognize today. There simply was little practical imperative for closer cooperation, fealty, or recognition of authority ... that is, until 1826!

1826 ... The Morgan Affair and its aftermath (the Anti-Masonic Movement), which so seriously damaged the Fraternity for decades, required the Craft to give serious thought to and expend considerable energy in reestablishing its reputation and position in communities throughout America. In the case of the Scottish Rite, the realization came quickly that a multitude of scattered bodies, pursuing their own purposes and status in their individual environs, would not serve the long-term interests of the Rite. In answer to that challenge, the Supreme Council organized, defined, and enforced the clear lines of authority of the Orient and Valley structure so familiar to us today.

This Month’s Trivia Question (answer in next month’s *Rite Works*): What is the distinction between a Deputy of the Supreme Council and a Sovereign Grand Inspector General (S.G.I.G.)? Why is that distinction a necessary one?


